## LOOKING BACK

THE recent announcement in 'The Ringing World ' of Mr. Cyril 1 F. Johnston's resignation from the directorate of Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, Ltd., of Croydon, breaks an active partnership of over 40 years with a firm in which for the greater part of that time he was the controlling influence, particularly in regard to bells. Some 10 years after Canon Simpson had introduced his scientific method of tuning bells, Mr. Jolinston, then a young man barely out of his teens, decided not only to master the principles but to introduce his own ideas in the development of this science. A life study has borne fruit, and Mr. Johnston can look back to about 50 carillons in all parts of the world which have come not only from his firm but in which he has given that personal supervision in tuning and details of the contract. This is apart from the hundreds of rings of church bells hung for change ringing. It is a record that rivals that of the great 17 th century Dutch firm of Haemory Bros., of Amsterdam, which between 1644 and 1684 gave to Europe some 50 carillons.
Two of the largest carillons with which he was associated were provided through the munificence of John D. Rockefeller, jun., who visited Crovdon: That at Riverside Drive Church, New York, contains 72 bells in a tower 400 ft . high, with ascent by four elerators. The big bass bell in C weighs $18 \frac{1}{4}$ tons. The sister carillon in the chapel of Chicago University has also 72 bells with a bass bell of 17 tons in C sharp.
Another carillon he looks back upon wt h special pride is that in the Houses of Parliament at Ottawa. These 53 bells, with the largest weighing 10 tons, were provided to mark the Glith anniversary of the confederation of Canadian provinces in 1927. At the inaugural ceremony a squadron of 12 American planes, led by Col. Lindberg, attended, and one of the planes crashed. The funeral march was played on the new carillon by Leféve when the dead airman was buried. As far as London is concerned, probably the carillon that was most publicised was that for the Wellington War Memorial, New Zealand. Recitals were given on it daily by Clifford Ball, of Bournville, in Hyde Park during the summer of 1930.

A memorable day for Mr. Johnston occurred in May, 1925, when King George $\mathbf{V}$. and Queen Mary visited the Croydon works and saw a number of bells cast, including a ring for Great Haseley, in Oxfordshire, and a bell for Buckingham Palace. Some 10.000 people visited the works that day. There lave been other roval visits. Princess Beatrice came to see Carisbrooke bells cast, and the Duke of Connaught also attended. But royalty have not by any means been the only visitors it has been Mr. Johnston's privilege to entertain. Many will recall the three mammoth tea parties given by Mr. Johnston to the Exercise-that in 1932, embracing a company of 2,300 ringers and friends. Seventy of the prettiest girls in Croydon acted as hostesses and talked glibly if not always accurately about Superlative and higher methods to the amusement of those present.
Mr. Johnston's reminiscences would indeed fill a book. In the first World War he served with the Grenadier Guards in France, and in The last war was in command of a Works Home Guard Company, which had the benefit of Guards instructors from Wellington Barracks. The Rt. Hon. Oliver Lyttelton was his adjutant in France, and in 1944, wLen Mr. Johnston was elected Master of the Clock Makers Company (the year of the centenary of the firm) Mr. Oliver Lyttelton was his principal guest. About six months ago his name appeared in the Honours List, when he was appointed an officer of the Order of the British Empire "for work done in development of the art of bell founding and tuning in this country.'
Like our other principal founders, Mr. Johnston is a practical ringer, being a pupil of the late Dr. Carpenter. He has some 32 peals to his credit, and one in which he has the happiest recol-
lections was that at Edenbridge, called by W. G. Smith, in which all the ringers were members of his firm. He was the hon. secretary of the Surrey County Association for upwards of nine years. His son at Winchester is learning to ring, and Mrs. Johnston has entered very fully into all his activities, having on many occasions acted as clerk to him in the inspection of bells and bell frames. Space prevents us from giving but a cursory glance at a busy life of great interest to the ringing fraternity. A book of reminiscences would make a popular appeal.

## A NOTE ON METHOD STRUCTURE

(With special reference to 'London.') Increasing interest in ringing on the higher number prompts reconsideration of the question of some Royal and Maximus methods published and rung under familiar names of Major methods, yet not always acceptable as the methods so named. The London method is still generally regarded as one of the most difficult to be rung, and as giving its successive, ringers a 'hall mark.' It may therefore be of some interest generally to realise that a systematic analysis of its structure permits it to be defined in such a way that the method may 16 evolved, free of adulterations, as Royal and Maximus extensions of the original or hasic method.
(The following is an abridged extract from a work on Principles of Method Structure in Change Ringing, and the rights of reproduction elsewhere of this article are reserved by the author.)
The main reason, perhaps, for so much controrersy on the subject of extension is the lack of staled principles or conditions of the matter. A clearer idea of what is involved seems essential. There are two points of

The Ideal. This demands that extensions must be identical in form with the basic. Strictly speaking, this can be the case only with 'Original,' though some consider that such methods as Plain Bob, (irandsire, Cambridge, Yorkshire and the like, come within this category.
2. The Proximate. This demands that the recognised extension, or contraction, must be the nearest obtainable form of the hasic, having regard to certain conditions or principles of method structure.
Since the majority of recognisable extensions may be considered as falling within category 2, such conditions may be set forth as below.
In view of the unfortunate pronouncements, mmbiguous and erroneous, sometimes made in regard to method structure, it is necessary, first of all, to restate, in simple terms to avoid all doubt as to intended meaning, the fundamentals, and to show how the concluded conditions or principles are derived from them. Thus:-

Methods having a hunt-bell (or huntbells as in Grandsire with two) produce rows of changes in sets usually called "leads.' These sels of rows are linked together where the hunt-bell is found 'at the lead.' The actual dividing line between any one 'lead' of rows and its successor is thus between the two rows which have the hunt-bell at its full lead. So the first row of any 'lead' is the one with the hunt-bell striking the last blow of its full lead, before hunting up to the back: while the last row of the set is the one with the hunt-bell (usually the treble) back down again at lead, and striking the first blow of its full lead there.
B. Each set of rows ('lead') divides into exactly similar halves, on either side of an atlwart dividing line which separates the two rows where the hunt-bell lies full behind. This divides the set into two "half-leads,' the second of which will be found to be an exact 'reflection' of the first, so called because the similarity of network of the bell-paths is obvious if a mirror be placed on the dividing line to face the first or upper half, and the reflection in the mirror be compared with what lies below it in the second or lower half. C. All sets or 'leads' of the plain course of a hunt-controlled method are identical in structure.
D. It follows from $B$ and $C$ above that a reflection' (similar to that found about the half-lead dividing line) will be found about the dividing line between the leads themselves, i.e., the first half of any lead is the "reflection' of the second or last half of the lead immediately preceding it.
E. In methods with more than one huntbell these dividing lines occur at the midspaces between the rows of the full leads and lialf-leads respectively of those several huntbells.
F. At each of such dividing lines a bell 'makes a place' across the line. This is known as the turning or pivot-place. Thus, there is a pivot-place for the lead and a pivotplace for the half-lead, known respectively as the 'full lead pivot' and the 'half-lead pivot.' The reason for the name may be seen from $B$ and $D$ above, in so far as the reflection of the work of the place-making bell gives it a path after the place, which is the reflection of its path before the place. Hence the two similar parts of its path turn about its 'pivot' place.
G. Pivot places are fundamental and are fixed throughout the range of a method, in contraction from or extension from the basic. The positions of the places thus made are always counted as so many away from the huntbell. The full lead pivot place is counted as so many places away from the hunt-bell's full lead, while the half-lead pivot place is ccunted as so many away from the hunt-bell's full lie. Where a pivot bell makes its place at the extreme position in the row (that is, at the end opposite to the leading or lying of the huntbell(s), it is said to givot in the 'extreme place.
H. In 'double' methods, the pivot places at the lie are are same numerically as at the lead, i.e., the same number of places from the position of the hunt-bell. In single methods they may be the same, but frequently are different. But in any case, whatever the positions are in the basic, so they remain throughoul extension or contraction of the method. Any variation of these positions at cither lead or lie is a departure from the parent method. The extreme place is always at pne end of the row.
I. Following are examples of pivots in methods:-

Method. Full-lead pivot. Half-lead pivot Plain Bob Cambridge Cambridge Grandsire
Double Norwich Seconds Thirds Extreme

Seconds Extreme Extreme London Seconds Kent Extreme Extreme Albion T.B. Seconds Extreme
J. Reconsidering what has been said in B, $D$ and $F$ above, it may be seen that the pattern of the whole working path of any bell divides into two main halves; the first part pivots around the full lead place-making and may be known as 'Lead-pivot Section,' while the second part pivots round the half-lead place-making and may be known as the Half-lead-pivot Section. Now since each of these sections divides again into two parts, the second being the reflection of the first (as we have seen), we have, in all, four sections of bell-path work, mutually reflective in pairs. $K$. These four sections of work are to be found in all hunt-controlled methods as accented for ringing by the Exercise of to-day.
NOTE.-All the fundamentals stated above apply throughout the range of extension and contraction of hunt-controlled methods. Any so-called variant of a method which does not conform with them is clearly not the original method on that number of bells, and should be given another name or a name variant. There are other reasons for forfeiture of name-claim, as will be seen.

## OBITUARY OF THE WEEK

MR. FREDERICK G. BIGGS.
With regret we record the death of Mr . Frederick G. Biggs, of Hughenden, Bucks, who died on Christmas morn, aged 81. He was for over 60 years a ringer at Hughenden, an excellent striker, and could take any bell in any method.
He had a vivid recollection of Lord Beaconsfield, and as a choirboy attended the funeral in 1881. He had many 'firsts' to his credit, including the first of London for the Oxford Guild in 1892, almost the first of Alliance ever rung (Crawley rang the first the previous day), the first of D.N. and Superlative for Bucks among many others. He was always ready and willing to assist beginners, and very helpful in keeping the bells in going order.
Many of his 274 peals were rung with such stalwarts as Canon G. F. Coleridge, the Rev. F. E. Robinson, the three Australian tourists, W. H. Fussell, George Martin and J. S. Goldsmith, and that prince of ringers, J. W. Washbrook, probably the greatest exponent ever, and the first ever to ring two tower bells to a peal, a feat at that time so incredible that the editor of the Bell News refused to publish it until he received confirmation, which was quickly forthcoming with further similar peals and then eclipsed ly taking a pair of bells to Stedman in the Rev. F. E. Robinson's thousandth peal. Fred rang more than a hundred peals with his son, Mr. Roland Biggs.
By trade a first-class chairmaker, he was one of the very few real craftsmen remaining in this deplorable age of mass production.
The funeral was at Hughenden on January 1st, many ringers from surrounding towers attending, and four of his brother ringers of Hughenden acting as bearers. A course of Triples was rung at the graveside, followed hy a short touch on the tower bells. In the evening a peal of Stedman Triples was rupg.

## MR. R. EDWARDS.

By the passing of Mr. Richard Edwards, St. Oswald's, Oswestry, has lost a ringer who for 57 years was a model of punctual and regular attendance. On Sunday, December 19th, he was ringing as usual, but two days later was taken ill and died in a few hours at the age of 77 .
Mr. Edwards has not a prolific peal ringer, ringing about 20 in the standard methods, but was rarely absent on a Sunday. Surely his epitaph is ', Well done, thou good and faithtul servant."

The same bells were rung muffled for his funeral by members of the Diocesan Guild. In a tribute, the Rector (the Rev. A. E. McCaig) mentioned lis work as chorister, parish clerk and captain of the ringers for many years. He as sisted in coaching many beginners. He was a personality and will be missed and rememhered for many years.

## A 200th ANNIVERSARY

Dear Sir,-Regarding the peal of Grandsire Caters at Reading on December 22nd the following may be of interest to your readers. In the 'Reading Mercury' under date of November 26th, 1748, is the following:-

At this date St. Laurence's Church bells, 10 in number, $x$ ere cast and hung by the ingenious Mr. Catlin, of Shoe Lane, London, and the event was commemorated by the Society of Reading Youths ringing a compleat peal of 5,040 Cators in 3 hours and twenty-nine minutes.
No record can now be found of the names of those taking part in this peal and no records of the Reading Youths are known to exist, and further application to the Bodleian Library has failed to find a copy of the 'Reading Mercury' of that date.
The church records state that at that date the existing eight bells were recast and turned into a ring of ten.
On November 27th, 1948, an attempt was made to ring 5,040 Grandsire Caters, but it came to grief after two hours' ringing through two bells changing over, but a second attempt, though not the same peal, was successful.
The peal rung in November, 1748, would be also the first in Reading and the first in Berk-shire.-Yours faithfully,

## TANWORTH IN-ARDEN

Until October, 1947, Tanworth-in-Arden, Warwickshire, had had a 'stoney' band. On December 18th, following an unsuccessful peal attempt, 1,260 Grandsire Doubles was rung by: John H. Jones 1, J. N. Lindon (cond.) 2, J. Scott 3, A. H. Fitter 4, A. D. Cook 5, A $J$. Colling 6 . This was the first quarter of Grandsire by all except the conductor.
A complete restoration of the bells and framework by Messrs. Mears and Stainbank is due to commence after Christmas and finish by May, 1949. The contract includes a new all-metal frame, rehanging in ball bearings, recasting the fifth and adding two new trebles.
The front five bells are by Richard Sanders, of Bromsgrove, and were cast in 1707. In 1733 the tenor was cast by Smith, of Edgbaston, the last major overhaul being in 1894.
To have a permanent record of the bells a gramophone recording was made. If anyone would like a copy they are asked to contact Mr. John H. Jones, Bank House, Tanworth-in-Arden, near Birmingham.

## A SUFFOLK VIEW ON THE B B.C

Dear Sir,-In endorsing the Somerset pro test in a recent issue of 'The Ringing World I wish to acquaint my fellow-ringers of my experience with the B.B.C. in doing my best lo get campanology properly recognised by them. We shall not get the recruits so urgently needed in the art until the general public realise that it is not just a matter of removing one's coat and tugging like blazes at a ton of metal.
I recall the journalist's report of the peal at Chelmsford, which gave the impression (in ignorance) that the door was locked to prevent anyone stopping the ringers from making a noise
We were given a place of honour by Maurice Brown in the St. George's Day broadcast and, as you know, were cut down as much as possible in the final arrangement of the programme. This recording was one of the finest pieces of striking I have ever heard, and in reply to my request to purchase the record I was politely informed that it was their copyright and they didn't intend to part with a copy. I pointed out that if a band leader had a few bars played and was faded down to allow the commentator to start talking it would be regarded as an insult.
The 'Radio Times' printed the name of the Vicar and organist, but the name of the ringing conductor or mention of the bells did not seem to matter.
I was once told by a B.B.C. director that ringers seemed so keen on their art that they had little or no time for the listening public, and was also asked what we saw in it. I replied that, apart from all the interest which ringing produced, I had 40,000 good friends spread about the country.
My part in the St. George's Day programme was to arrange for the ringing item, and I pointed out that one of the important things was to have the 'mike' on the best side of the tower, also the correct distance away, but in the few broadcasts we have had since this advice has not appeared to be of any importance to the B.B.C., with the result that we often get the tenors drowning the trebles.
Here's wishing us all a 'striking, New Year, with recruits available to get every ring of bells in the country sending forth their message of peace and goodwill every Sunday.-Yours fraternally,
