GREAT ADVENTURE II IS PLANNED FOR 1963

'It gives us great pleasure to announce that definite plans are now in hand to bring a party of British ringers to Australia and New Zealand in the latter part of 1964. Great Adventure II, as we shall call it, is on.'

1941S announcement is made in an editorial appearing in the November issue of 'Ringing Towers,' the Australian and New Zealand Association of Bell-ringers' journal.

The organiser is T. J. Lock, well known for his ringing tours in Britain, and those who have indicated that they are definitely interested are: Miss Ruth Foreman, Messrs. A. P. Cannon, J. L. Garner-Hayward, N. V. Harding, T. J. Lock, A. G. Mason, S. Burton, F. Perrins, C. W. Pipe, F. Sharpe, T. W. White, W. Williams, W. G. Wilson, J. Worth and E. H. Mastin. Others 'on the fence,' so to speak, are: Messrs. C. Edward Jefferies, E. C. Shepherd, W. F. Moreton, P. Mehew and F. C. Price.

Mr. W. B. Pitcher, of South Australia, comments: 'This is news of the first importance to ringing in Australia and New Zealand, and we know that all A.N.Z.A.B. ringers will react to it with keen delight. Having a party of such eminent ringers in our towers will be of tremendous interest and benefit to us all, and it will be a gala occasion, one in which we can show the traditional Australian and New Zealand hospitality. The tourists of 1934 found that these were hospitable shores. We are sure that a second party will find that there has been no change in that regard over the intervening 30 years.'

Giving details, Mr. Pitcher states: 'It is envisaged that the party embarking on Great Adventure II will fly out and spend one month in Australia and possibly two weeks in New Zealand. The likely time is September-October, 1964. Tom Lock says that they particularly want to assist local bands in every possible way, and generally to strengthen the bonds between Britain and Australia and New Zealand. Also they hope to ring one or more peals in every ringable tower, if this can be arranged.'

Addressing his own readers in the two Commonwealths, the 'Ringing Towers' editor writes: 'It is up to us to see that it is arranged, and we suggest that it is not too early to begin now, particularly in those towers where permission for peals is usually not easily obtained. We suggest that Societies make an approach to their church authorities at the first convenient moment, seeking permission for two peals. If any difficulty is encountered there are at least two very good points that can be made:

that to have a number of eminent British ringers, journey so far to ring on our bells is surely a special occasion, and

that a long-range programme of advanced publicity will be given to make the event one of publicinterest.

We feel certain that Australia and New Zealand ringers will be most cordial in their welcome. It has been a great privilege in recent years to welcome to these shores a number of ringers from 'Down Under,' and their appreciation has been expressed in our columns. The list of names published is purely tentative at this stage, and Mr. Locke has not a closed shop as regards ringers interested, and he will be pleased to answer inquiries.

WRITERS WITH KNOWLEDGE

ATELY we have received a number of well-written articles explaining ringing to the public from the inside. One of the best was by Mrs. Ida Hawcock, in 'The Sign,' entitled 'Ringing Out the Christmas Bells.' She writes as a knowledgeable mother with two boys ringing.

'When we plan our holidays,' she writes, 'the boys' first thought is what towers may be near enough for them to visit, and out comes *Dove* or, more precisely, *The Church Bells of Britain*, by Ronald H. Dove. This book gives details of all the towers in the country, with the number of bells, their weight, and practice night. It reminds me of the train-spotting books, for the boys underline the towers where they have rung as they used to the trains they spotted. Ringing visitors always receive a friendly welcome and are invited to have a ring and to sign the visitors' book.'

We also get a mention. Mrs. Hawcock comments: 'Since 1911 the bellringers have had their own weekly journal, *The Ringing World*, and even to the uninitiated it makes fascinating reading. So does *The Ringers' Diary*, which must be included among the boys' Christmas presents.'

The article concludes: 'Thus their interest is stimulated, but church bells are first and foremost part of the Church's call to the people. Whether they peal forth in grand manner rung by experts, or clang unevenly as the learners strive to do their best, they are still "the artillery of the Church".'

Another article that gave us great pleasure was 'By Whom the Bells Toll,' written by Marjorie Craddock for *The Hereford Times*. Marjorie's article is largely concerned with Hereford Cathedral bells and the awesome climb to the ringing chamber.

'I shall never again hear the bells of Hereford Cathedral ringing out across river, meadows and city without thinking of the 168 steps of that spiral stone staircase up which every one of the ten ringers have had to climb and up which ringers have been climbing for 600 years. . . .

WELCOMING THE NEW YEAR AT WINCHESTER



THE turn of the year is a matter of some consequence to the various dignitaries, both spiritual and secular, of the ancient city of Winchester. The annual ceremony of 1962-63 took place in the ringing chamber of the Cathedral, according to long established custom.

Having raised the bells and rung a few rounds to ensure that the muffles were correctly adjusted, the ringers adjourned to the Deanery, to be entertained to an excellent supper, during which they received the thanks of the Dean and Chapter for their work during the past 12 months. The captain, in his reply, assured the Dean (the Very Rev. O. H. Gibbs-Smith) of the continued goodwill of the band.

Sharp at 10.30, the band returned to the tower to speed the old year to its close with half-muffled rounds and changes, in which all ringers (and learners) present took part.

Towards the end of the last touch of Grandsire, the ringing chamber began to fill with a large and notable company, including the Lord Bshop (the Rt. Rev. S. F. Allison), the Dean and Vice-Dean, the Cannon Treasurer (who is also a ringer), the Member of Parlia-

RINGING OUT THE OLD YEAR AT A CHURCH IN A FARMYARD

1962 was rung out with 120 of Grandsire, the tenor was rung 12 times, and 1963 rung in with rounds and Queens. Nothing unusual in that, except that the last New Year to be rung in at St. Peter-de-Ditton. Droitwich Spa, was 1938!

This silence was broken by members of the St. Peter's Guild, with the help of John Whittall, of Claines. The Vicar and his wife were present, and remarked that they were surprised to see so many ringers present, having braced Arctic conditions to get to the church, which stands in the middle of a farmyard, 200 yards from a road, and deep in snow!

The keenness of the local band was in evidence on the previous Sunday, when seven ringers battled with the snow and rang for morning service, calling a congregation of three to church!

LOCKED IN THE BELFRY!

On descending the belfry stairs after ringing in the New Year, ringers at Cossington, Somerset, found that the tower door had been locked from the outside!

They eventually escaped when one of the band climbed down a bell rope hung out of the belfry window and went round and unlocked the door.

The culprit has since been traced, but the cuprit has since been traced, but the ringers threaten to ring all night until released, if this occurs next year. (Although it is doubtful if the tower captain will ever leave the key in the door again.)

50 YEARS AGO

R.W. January 3rd, 1913.-

There are early birds at Horley, and on Christmas morning they, so to speak, caught the early worm, for they scored a peal of Grandsire Triples before the 6.30 a.m. service.

'R.W.' January 10th, 1913.-

Southwark Cathedral must be among the lucky' towers. Treble Twelve. Stedman Cinques and now Cambridge Maximus have been rung there within a month. The tenoras is well known, is over 50 cwt., and it speaks volumes for the excellent work of the beli hanger; (Messrs. Mears and Stainbank) that the bells go so extremely well.

R.W.' January 17th, 1913.-

Something out of the ordinary was rung at Chester last week, when the Chester Guild scored a peal of Double Grandsire Triples. This is the sort of thing which shows enterprise, and it would stimulate more interest if other novelties of this kind were more frequently introduced in other towers to add variety to performances.

Inter-town Rivalry Produced This Twelve

CT. MARY'S is situated at the highest point in Oldham. The earliest mention of bells is a ring of six, cast by Mellors, of Nottingham. These bells were later recast to a ring of eight by Rudhall, with a tenor of between 12 and 14 cwt. The bells were hung in the tower of the old Church of St. Paul, which stood on the site of the present parish church. A number of long lengths were rung on this Rudhall eight, notably:

September 30th, 1783—10.080 Bob Major. 5 hours 30 minutes.

January 4th, 1784—14.482 Bob Major, 8 hours 24 minutes.

October 24th, 1807—15.120 Bob Major, 8 hours 46 minutes.

February 7th, 1821—14.016 Treble Bob Major. 7 hours 26 minutes (Eversfield's composition).

Shortly after the last peal the church was pulled down and the present building erected. The tower is tall and very slender being but II feet square in the bell room.

GOING ONE BETTER

The story of the rivalry between the Oldham and Ashton ringers has been told many times and the details have appeared in 'The Ringing World.' Suffice it to say here that because the latter had increased their ring to ten in 1819 the Oldham people determined to go one better and ordered a ring of twelve from the Whitechapel Foundry, the tenor of which weighed 32 cwt. 2 qr. 16 lb. These were hung in a two-tier timber frame with two bells on top.

The first peal on the new 12 was Grandsire Cinques on September 2nd. 1830, and on March 6th, 1832, 7,392 Kent Maximus was rung in 5 hours 14 minutes. A peal board in the tower, dated about this time, gives the tenor as being 34 cwt., and it is on record that the bell was generally considered to be of this weight. In 1847 a peal of Kent Treble Bob Cinques was rung, being one of the few peals on this arrangement.

In 1896 the tower was restored and the bells were rehung in a cast iron frame, seated upon oak girders. The canons were removed at this time and it was estimated that the tenor's weight was reduced to about 31 cwt. From reports from ringers who took part in peals on the restored ring the bells must have gone extremely well, although they appear to have been difficult to maintain. have been difficult to maintain.

FINE ENGINEERING

In the early 20's it was decided to have a clean sweep and the bells were recast and rehung in a new frame by the Loughborough foundry. This frame is considered to be one of the bell hanging achievements of the century, the total weight of the frame being something approaching 18 tons and literally holds the tower together.

An indication of the quality of this piece of engineering can be gathered from the fact that the tenor of the recast ring weighs 35 cwt. The bells are not easy to ring, particularly in Surprise Maximus, when the tower has a tendency to twist with the heavy bells out of coursing order. The trebles which are on top of the frame, having a rope length of approximately 90 feet, are extremely tricky to handle under these conditions.

A visitor to the tower cannot help but marvel that such a fine and heavy ring of 12 can be installed and rung with reasonable comfort in such a tall and slender tower.

SEVEN BELLS CRACKED WHILE REMOVING CANONS

A stop press item in the Christmas issue of 'Ringing Towers,' the journal of the Australian and New Zealand Association of Bellringers, records that during the removal of the canons of the bells of St. Paul's Church, Bendigo, at the Bendigo Ordnance Factory, seven of the eight bells were scriously cracked.

It appears that the recommended method of removal of the canons was to use a flexible disc cut off wheel, but when this was found to be too slow the quicker but more drastic nethod of an 'air are' electrode cutter, finishing off probably with a heavy hammer, was adopted. The crowns were then turned into a convex shape.

Mr. Warne Wilson says that the Ordnance Factory seems to be able to prove, with the aid of X-ray photographs, that the cracking was largely due to inherent stresses in the metal, let Joose when the casting skin was removed on the lathe, but they do acknowledge part responsibility for the way in which the job was done. All work has been stopped until Messrs. Mears and Stainbank's advice has been obtained on whether welding the cracks is practicable. The afternative is a complete recasting.

This is indeed a tragedy, and a great setback to the high hopes of Bendigo ringers. For nine year Mr. Warne Wilson, the captain, has been campaigning to have the bells restored, and when success seemed in sight, and funds were forthcoming from public appeal, this misforture has occurred.

The bells of St. Paul's. Bendigo, were cast in the Whitechapel Foundry in 1872, the cost being met by public subscription, and the bells carried to Australia in the famous 'Cutty Sark.'

Bendigo bells have always had a difficult

Bendigo bells have always had a difficult 'go.' the reason being that the bells are hung high in a brick tower. The structure, states 'Ringing Towers.' is so subject to movement that the spire which it was intended should surmount the tower was never

built.

To meet this difficulty a new frame has been sent out from the Whitechapel Foundry, and the girders for a new frame have been set in a concrete ring, 18 feet lower in the tower. The bells had been sent to the Ordnance Factory to have the canons removed and everything was planned for the bells to ring out again in early December.

To Warne Wilson and his band, ringers from all over the world extend their sympathy.

RESPECT TRADITION

Dear Sir,—Although I am a comparative mew-comer to the Exercise, I have already had experience of the battles which rage over Minor methods and open leads versus close leads—indeed the local society to which I belong is 'notorious' (in the best sense of the word) for its close lead ringing—and I can only come to the conclusion that these battles are ridiculous and futile.

Might I respectfully suggest that if eight, ten- and twelve-bell ringers are going to encroach upon six-bell territory they stop burying their heads in the sand and invest 4s. 6d. in the Central Council's Collection of Minor Methods—there are, surprising as it may seem, other Minor methods besides Plain Bob and Cambridge!

Admittedly ten- and twelve-bell ringers are

Admittedly ten- and twelve-bell ringers are not going to spend time in their own towers ringing Minor on the 'back six'—that would be taking it too far—but it would be a gesture very much appreciated when, say, the Yorkshire Association holds a meeting which incorporates a six-bell tower, if the visiting ringers would come prepared to ring close leads and methods other than the two

leads and methods other than the two previously mentioned.

When we leave home ground we are expected to, and we do, adapt ourselves immediately to the conditions under which we are ringing, to the best of our ability. But you can understand why we become exasperated when illustrious ringers, who are known to ring regularly at towers such as York Minster, demand Plain Bob Minor—with open leads! Surely they are not going to be defeated by a few simple Minor methods!

And as for Mr. Brand's remarks about living in the obscure past in some corner in Yorkshire, surely the whoic purpose of ringing today is to preserve an age-old tradition, and it is hardly fair to malign one particular ringer who is greatly respected among his own fraternity because he chooses to help preserve one aspect of ringing which

among his own fraterinty because he chooses to help preserve one aspect of ringing which includes close leads and some methods, which to you appear odd.

Just think how tedious ringing would become if we all rang the same methods, all the time. Variety is the spice of life. Mr. Brand. and certainly the spice of ringing.—Yours faithfully,

PEAL WRITING FEE DISPUTE

Hence, some ringers would prefer to pay the peal fee to an organisation in which all the money goes to some useful fund. Also, most of these peals were rung for a new Society (formed because of the Association's peal fee policy), which has no peal fee, and in this case I am told that the 6d. per rope is still paid, but into the offertory box of the church concerned, instead. 'Apparently a very early ring of bells, perhaps the earliest of which there is record since the Reformation. They were originally cast by John Wallis during the incumbency of the Rev. George Ferebe (see 5th bell), who was vicar 1593-1616. Aubrey (Nat. Hist. of Wilts. p. 109) says "Mr. Ferraby, the minister of Bishop's Cannings. was an ingenious man and an excellent musician. When King James was in these parts Mr. Ferraby entertained his Majesty with bucoliques of his own making... Whilst his Majesty was thus diverted, the eight bells (of which he was the cause) did ring, and the organ was played on for state. This parish organ was played on for state. This parish in those dayes would have challenged all England for musique, football and ringing," Possibly some other ringer will be able to supply data as to the Merton College octave.

Mr. Ivin has had a previous peal of Bristol with this quality appear in your columns, i.e. one of 5,024 changes, which was first rung at St. Paul's, Bedford, on July 16th, 1962, and it is this composition to which I should like to draw attention. It is, in fact, a variation of a peal of 5,056 changes by the late John L. Morris. which was introduced as recently as July 5th, 1958.

I submit the figures of this peal as they appeared in 'The Ringing World' at that time and leave it to those interested to draw their own conclusions as to the similarity of the two compositions.—Yours faithfully.

John Tonne and Stephen Tonni, Bell Founders

A BELL FOUNDRY of some importance existed at Bury St. Edmunds in the latter half of the 15th century and that establishment of long ago has inspired generous degrees of interest and speculation in that it more than likely produced cannons-of-destruction as well as peaceful bells. Shields placed by a Bury founder upon his bells, circa 1500, often display, among other devices, a cannon.

It is thought that this foundry was carried on successively by two men named Chyrch, Chirche or Church—father and son—Reginald Chyrch and Thomas Chyrch—both of whom cast several bells for East Anglia, particularly Suffolk and Cambs.

The Chyrch family business is mentioned here in view of the possibility of its indirect connection with William Culverden, of London, for it would appear that the Bury foundry passed into the hands of Stephen Tonni in the mid-16th century, the father (?) of whom is mentioned is the celebrated Culverden's will:

'... In Witness whereof to this present testament and last will I have subscribed my name with myn own hande... These being witnesse unto the same, Thomas Holland. John Tynne, Thomas Lawrence, John Leyland. William Anys, Robert Pemberton, Thomas Hayward, with diverse other parsones...' Thomas Lawrence greatly benefited by Culverden's will. There is good reason to assume that John Tynne and John Tonne.

The names Tonne and Tonni to all effects and purposes have an analysish foreign.



The names Tonne and Tonni to all effects and purposes have an undeniable foreign flavour, and this is substantially confirmed when studying the habits of John Tonne in his capacity as a bell founder: of occasionally dating bells and of putting his name on them; by placing a floriated cross on the waist of the bell with his name-beneath, definitely a regular practice abroad: and the French character of Tonne's lettering, all of which bear evidence to the contrary of his being English by birth. Then again, the founder's name gives rise to speculation, being derived from the French Antoine. These points were wholly agreeable to the late Mr. A. P. Tyssen, who had examined several ancient bells in Picardy.

PROTECTIVE RIGHTS

How was it than, that Tonne practised bell founding in England? As in other crafts, the principles of protection had extended themselves to bells by the year 1483. The statute, one might suppose, can be compared in a way with the statements and declarations opinioned

over Common Market negotiations! It was designed to protect British craftsmen and encourage industry, yet despite rigid rules and regulations, a few specimens of bells from Louvain and Venlo found their way to this country. The protective statute was considered to be very efficient, and if a craftsman (including, of course, the bell founder) experienced any great difficulty, he was allowed to set up for himself or seek employment at the hands of a master founder.

Should the founder have a sideline as some evidently did ('Danyell Fonder' was also a vinter') then a foreigner with an astute knowledge of bells would be a definite asset. The statute provided protection for the man as well as the master; thus in 1523 it was decreed that no alien should take an alien apprentice nor keep more than two alien journeymen. Accordingly, bell founders in London particularly, in common with other crafts, had their interests well looked after by 'union-minded' officials, the statute proceeding in these terms:

'... And that the Wardens of the said Citie of ev'ry such handycrafte, with one straunger or householder as is aforesaid of the same crafte, have full power and autorite by this p'sent acte to lymytte and appoynte to ev'y straunger of the mystery and handy crafte that they be inhabityng

withyn the said Citie Suburbes places or pcyncte above remembered a pper mark without takyng anythyng therfor, by the which their wares, vesselles and workmanshippe that they make may be knowen.'

There is, of course, no firm evidence of John Tonne ever having been employed by Culverden. All in all, taking into account his foreign mannerisms when about his business, and touching upon that particular reference to someone called 'Tynne,' concerning Culverden's will, it may well be that the 'alien' Tonne, possibly understanding the future destiny of the foundry in which he was employed, and having no desire to work under the highly favoured Thomas Lawrence, while confidently possessing new-found knowledge in the craft, plus his experience (we assume) of Continental bell founding, 'took the bull by the horns,' so to speak, leaving Culverden's premises a year or two before the master's death and set up for himself in Suffolk, or at any rate in E. Anglia. This was an area strongly favoured by a wealthy Flemish population and an experimental and fertile garden made ready for the final and most colourful development of the Gothic bloom.

Tonne cast a bell for Sullington, Sussex, in 1522—his earliest—and in 1536 three bells were provided by him for Botolph in the same county. In 1540 a product of his foundry was installed in the church tower at Stansted Mountlitchet, Essex.

It seems that Cambridgeshire has but one Tonne specimen—at Bulsham—a beautifully

It seems that Cambridgeshire has but one Tonne specimen—at Bulsham—a beautifully created bell, aborned by Continental ornamentation of which the three combined illustrations are examples. Tonne was equally fond of adorning his bells with busts of Henry VIII, the Royal Arms, medallions and other devices. His inscriptions are also interesting the bell at Balsham being inscribed:

INTONAT. CELIS. VOX. CAMPANA.



Now to pass on to John Tonne's son (again we must assume): 'Stephanus' Tonni, of Bury St. Edmunds, is discovered as early as 1559. As previously suggested. Stephen may have (aken over the old-established foundry of the Chyrch family. He provided several bells for churches in Cambridgeshire: Landbeach (1577). Wicken (1582), Stetchworth (1564), two bells for Little Wilbraham, and one for Cambridge St. Edward's (1576), two at Wood Ditton which can be regarded as historical monuments (1588), and two for the Round Church at Cambridge. Tonni's earliest inscription occurs at Reepham. Norfolk, dated 1559: BEATTI QUI HABITAT (sic) IN DOMO TUA DOMINE.

Tonni's 'trade mark' is well known, and consists of a crown and arrows, the emblem of St. Edmund. King and Martyr. Stephen also used a fleur-de-lis, and at Wicken and

Cambridge the initials 'W. L.' appear on his bells, these possibly of William Land, who may have been Tonni's foreman.

Tonni has been described as 'behind the times' in his inscriptions. In that respect it is only fair to state that the man rejoiced in is only fair to state that the man rejoiced in the Roman Catholic doctrine and this inbred faith was naturally displayed on his bells. We should also bear in mind that Stephen plied his craft in times of emotional stress when great changes were taking place in an England which was rapidly detaching itself from Rome.

which was rapidly detaching itself from Rome.

Before the final act of the Reformation,
Tonni used quite inoffensive inscriptions,
although these were actually in harmony
with the Roman doctrine, He came out
with portions of the Te Deum at Oxborough,
Norfolk, and elsewhere. Generally speaking
his manner at that time gives the impression
of bairs whether interestingly to a preference of being subdued—increasingly so as Reforma-tion activities gained strength. Thus he con-tinued using only his cross-and-arrow emblem until the notable year 4588.

antil the notable year 1588.

A change then came over him. His tenor at Wood Ditton, cast in that year, is a strange yet hopeful cry reversed through the difficult years to the 1520's. The familiar crown and arrows are discarded, and (here may be the clue betwixt father and son) Stephen reemploys those grand devices used by John Tonne: the Great Cross and the smaller ornaments (illustrated)—Continental in their origin and a quiet but unmistakabile tribute to Papal faith. Two mediæval inscriptions are resurrected in support of the founder's sympathetic inclinations to the Roman Church:

the first of which is regarded as being unique, and the second thought to have been originally used by John Tonne.

The late Canon Raven fascinatingly suggested that Stephen Tonni had been, throughout a concealed opponent of the Reformation. It is not difficult to understand that, with the dawning of the eventful year, 1588, the Reformation was unhappily confronted with destructive ideologies from far-away Spain. As Philip and his mighty Armada purposely approached English shores, it seemed to our Papist bell founder that retribution was at hand, and that with the fall of Elizabeth the old faith would be restored throughout the land. Who of those loyal founders should welcome it but he himself, through the medium of his handiwork: his last bells at Wood Ditton.

But it was not to be. The visual expressions of his hopes depicted on those bells were destined to laud and magnify God, through the new and abiding Faith: also to perpetuate the memory of John Tonne and Stephen Tonni—bell foundets extraordinary.

He had not rung many peals, but as a Sunday service ringer he was 100 per cent. Being musical, he loved a well-struck touch or quarter musical, he loved a well-struck touch or quarter peal. Our last peal together was at Christ Church, Mitcham, on December 10th, 1949. Since I moved to West Tarring 5½ years ago. Jack and I had been great pals (inside and outside the church).
