## Church of St. Mary the Virgin, Plympton

THERE is an old local saying which runs: THERE is an old local saying which runs:
"Plympton was a busy town while
Plymouth was a fuzzy down." This saying
is perfectly true, for Plympton was indeed
a busy town of considerable importance
when Plymouth, or Sutton-on-Plym as it
was then, was merely a small fishing settlement at the mouth of the River Plym.
Towards the end of the 9th century there
existed at "Plymentum" a Saxon monastery
which was a college of secular clergy, not
being a community of monks in the accepted sense; it was free from episcopal
jurisdiction, being a chapel of the foundation of one of the Saxon kings. In 1121 the

tion of one of the Saxon kings. In 1121 the secular community was dispersed at the direction of William Warelwast, Bishop of Exeter, and a charter was gained to enable him to establish a community of Augustinian canons, the priory being dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary and St. Peter and St. Paul. The Priory grew in power and came to be regarded as the wealthiest in the Diocese of Exeter, collecting tithes from at least a dozen other parishes. The old connection is still indicated in the modern names of two of the parishes, Shaugh Prior and Dean Prior.

Unhappily, in 1539 the Priory was dissolved and its wealth and possessions appropriated by Henry VIII. So thorough was the work of destruction that nothing now remains save the priceless heritage of the great church dedicated to St. Mary-the-Virgin which was built by the monks to serve the townspeople of Plympton and which was consecrated on October 29th, 1311, by Bishop Stapledon, of Exeter.

The church stands in what was probably the cemetery of the old Priory and is one of the largest in the diocese. It measures 165 feet in length, 102 feet in width and the tower rises to a total height of 111 feet. It is built of Dartmoor granite, mainly in the Decorated and Perpendicular styles, with piers and arches of stone from the nearby estate of Lord Roborough. It is interesting to note that the church stands only very little above sea level, and the writer can recall the time in the late 1940s when the whole building was flooded to a depth of at least 2 feet. This occurred again in 1954, resulting in severe damage to furnishings and fittings; however, the consequential dredging and banking of the adjacent Tory Brook has eliminated the risk of this situation arising again.

### THE BELLS

Of the bells, we know that in 1614 two bells, the fourth and tenor of the present ring, were cast by George Purdue. The "Great" bell was the gift of Lady Marie Strode, wife of Sir William Strode, whose son, William Strode, Member of Parliament for Plymouth, figures in history as one of the five Members of Parliament whose at-tempted arrest by Charles I in 1642 preci-pitated the Civil War between King and Parliament.

St. Mary's appears to have possessed only the two bells until the 18th century, when the West Country bellfounding family of Pennington came on the scene. In 1725 Christopher Pennington, of Lezant, added two more bells, the present sixth and seventh. The bell to make a true five was not added until 1754, when Christopher Pennington, of Stoke Climpland and Pennington, then of Stoke Climsland, cast the present fifth. Although the fifth and

seventh are of relatively poor tonal quality, the authorities of St. Mary's must have been well pleased for in 1766 they commissioned John and Fitz Antony Pennington to provide a treble to complete the ring to six; this bell is of much better quality than the two previous Pennington additions.

Nothing more appears to have been done to the bells until 1868, when John Warner and Sons, of London, added two trebles to complete the octave, at the same time recasting the old Pennington fourth which presumably had become cracked. It is a great pity he did not also recast the old Pennington third and fifth, as his work here is of a very high quality. The completed eight produced a noble sound, the old Purdue tenor being recognised as one of the finest bells in the West of England, a bell whose sound would carry as far as Plymouth Hoe, nearly six miles away, and indeed it should have done for it possessed a clapper of nearly 3 cwt. to send its sound bawling out over the other seven bells. It was a bell whose "go" at that time would have daunted even our present day "tenor kings" for it required the full effort of two ringers to keep it up.

TROUBLE OVER TENOR

By the early 1930s the ringers of St. Mary's must have had their fill of this state of affairs for in 1933 a full restoration of the bells was carried out by Messrs. Gillett and Johnston, of Croydon, who provided a new steel frame and all new fittings as well as tuning the bells. The restored ring was dedicated by the Lord Bishop of Exeter on December 2nd, 1933. Apparently they dared to desecrate the fine old Purdue tenor by tuning it, for uproar immediately followed the restoration and the local consensus of opinion was that the bell was ruined; heated arguments ensued to the extent that one well-known local ringer, who shall be nameless, narrowly missed a libel action by the bellhangers. The writer, who at that time had only reached the ripe old age of two, cannot pass comment on the bell be-fore restoration, but it is nevertheless still recognised as being an extremely fine bell. It is well known how locals tend to exaggerate the weight of a bell and it has been stated that, before tuning, the bell weighed 29 or 30 cwt., although how any bell-founder could scrape out nearly 5 cwt. of metal to reduce it to its present weight of 25 cwt, and still leave something worth listening to is beyond the comprehension of the writer.

Since the days of the Priory the popula-tion of the parish of St. Mary's has grown from around 500 to nearly 16,000. The town of Plympton, which witnessed and nurtured the birth and growth of Plymouth, has now been completely taken over by her ever-hungry child. The ancient church of St. Mary is, I suppose, technically speaking the Mother Church of Plymouth, although this honour is more generally accorded to the Church of St. Andrew in the city centre. The present incumbent is the Ven. F. A. J. Matthews, M.A., Archdeacon of Plymouth, and he has a live church with many willing workers; it possesses a large, well-trained choir and a competent band of call-change ringers who man the bells regularly, producing a reasonably high standard of strik-

It is wonderful to consider that, in this age of space travel, the old Purdue tenor, the product of a master craftsman of over 300 years ago, still sends its booming notes over a parish that has seen so much change over the years. One wonders how many products of today's craftsmen will still be in use 300 years from now.

## "CROWN BOB" - & JAMES PLATT

ONE of the most notable advances in change-ringing during the past 50 years has been the development of Spliced. Although the idea of joining more than one method into a touch is almost as old as change-ringing itself, it was not until 1911, when a peal of Minor in 14 methods was rung at Edenham in Lincolnshire, that it began to attract general interest,

The brothers E. Bankes and H. Law James are generally accepted as the origina-tors of modern "spliced", which differs fundamentally from the "Crown Bob" of the 18th and 19th centuries in its requirement that spliced extents and peals should be true. Recent research has, however, shown that many of the principles developed in the 1910s and 1920s, and in particular those concerning the splicing of Minor, had already been realised and utilised half-a-century earlier, and that by the end of the 1850s true 720s of Minor in more than one method were being rung. That this was so was entirely thanks to a single man-a still rather nebulous figure named James Platt, of Saddleworth Fold, Yorkshire

### THE ORIGINS

Until Platt arrived on the ringing scene —and indeed for a number of years after-wards—the only form of splicing in anything approaching general practice was Crown Bob.

This had first appeared in print as early as 1702, in the first edition of the J. D. and "Campanalogia Improved", and consisted of consecutive leads of Oxford Treble Bob. College Pleasure and College Treble Bob. By repeating this sequence of leads four times a touch of 360 changes was obtained. By the late 1720s Benjamin Annable, at least, was aware of its falseness, and in the 4th edition of the "Campanalogia", published in 1752, the figures of the touch were omitted, the introductory remarks— "Now the practitioner being perfect in these three peals [i.e., Oxford T.B., College Pleasure and College T.B.], he may proceed to the next following; which is to ring an Eighteenscore without a Bob, as followeth. -being left to hang tantalisingly in mid-

Nevertheless, the falseness of the arrangement was not apparently generally realised. The touch was even doubled by singles, as at Newport, Isle of Wight, in 1793, 720s of Crown Bob at Wilby, Suffolk, in 1734, and at Cambridge in 1783 may have been similarly obtained. As late as 1851 the original 360 was being rung in Yorkshire, at Bingley.

The band here, however, were more venturesome than most, for they tried joining other methods in a similar way, albeit probably no less falsely. On August 17th, 1849, they rang "a 'Crown Bob' on the 'Three Flowers'," and on November 16th, 1851, "the company went successfully through various 'Touches' on some of the most intricate peals, including 'Snappers', and after that rang two 'Crown Bobs' on the following arrangements: Oxford, College Pleasure, College Treble, and Violet, Tulip, Prim-.. The latter portion of this feat (that is, the two 'Crown Bobs') is admitted by the best judges to be a most severe test, and is rarely attempted where the per-formers are all members of the same company."

### JAMES PLATT

Such then was the situation when James Platt turned his attention to splicing. Of the man himself little is yet known. He lived and rang at Saddleworth, a tower on the moors not far from Oldham, and, according to Morris's "History and Art", died at the age of 72 in September, 1858. Although he composed some peals of Treble Bob Major in addition to his pioneering work on 5- and 6-bell "peals", there is little evidence of his ability as a practical piper. Certainly all his known theoretical ringer. Certainly all his known theoretical work dates from the last 15 years of his life, and during this period he did not participate in any of the peals rung by the Saddleworth company nor in any with that at Glossop, a neighbouring tower with which he also had connections. He did ring a 720 of Plain Bob Minor at Saddleworth in 1845, but even this was on the treble.

It is not known what made Platt become interested in joining methods together, but it may well have been the first peal of Hudson's New Light Major, rung at Sheffield on March 21st, 1843. This was basically Kent T.B. with a lead of Oxford T.B. in each course keeping the tenors out of the slow. The idea at once became a "seven-day wonder" in the Midlands. A 7,200 was rung at Castleton in September the same year, and the following January a 5,040 of Oxford and Kent Treble Bob Triples, composed by Thomas Day, was rung at Shifnal in which "by the union of the two original methods, all additional place-making is avoided".

James Platt took Hudson's idea and turned it to Minor. On October 22nd, 1843, the celebrated ringers of Saddleworth, Yorkshire, rang a true peal of treble bob, consisting of 720 changes, in twenty-five minutes, on their sweettoned bells. In this peal there is neither bob nor single when the treble dodges before the third and fourth places are made both in the Oxford and Kent treble bob methods. This is the first peal ever rung in this method on six bells. . . . The peal was composed bells. . . . The peal was composed by James Platt, and conducted by Ralph Broadbent."

It is clear from the description that this was a 720 in what is now generally known as the Worcester Variation of Treble Bob. a form of "splicing" that was rediscovered by the Rev. E. Bankes James just after the end of the First World War. It was given its present name when a 720 of this arrangement was included in a peal at St. las', Worcester, in September, 1919, although a single 720 had been rung at Tichfield, Hants, a few months earlier.

For the next five or six years Platt experimented with single method extents. In March, 1844. Ralph Broadbent called 35246 a 54326 a 720 of Bob Minor of his at 42536 24536 Saddleworth, in which there was a single at each lead, "four 43256 different singles [being] made use of in this peal". The 35426 52346 figures of this 720 are interest-23546 ing. Singles were made in 1256 (a), 1236 (b) and 1234 (c); the fourth "single" required 34256 3 45326 a 54263 third's and fourth's places to Repeat be made as the treble passed from 2nds to lead, followed at four times.

A year later the Glossop company rang another of his 720s of Bob Minor, this one having only six bobs and six singles as though to balance the multiplicity of calls in the earlier extent. The same day (March 7th, 1845) they also rang 720 Oxford Treble Bob which he had composed. This was "rung without a bob, when in the treble dodges before there were 15 sixth places made instead of fourth places", an original form of three-bell shift which does not seem yet to have been resurrected.

His next production, however, has had very recent echoes in the columns of "The Ringing World". Holt's arrangement of Bob Minor to give extents without a single caught his eye, as it did Frank Blagrove's not long ago, and he set to to elaborate the idea. The result was a regular three-part with 18 calls in each part. "the treble assisting in making bobs". This Platt himself called from the treble at Saddleworth on September 28th, 1845. A contemporary report says (rather disdainfully, one feels): "In Mr. Holt's peal, the in and out of course changes are only changed twice; in this peal they are changed 24 times.

Some idea of the thoroughness with which Mr. Platt investigated such a simple method as Bob Minor can be gauged from his calculation that "a true peal can be rung of Plain Bob Minor, with making only two singles, one in the middle and the other at the end of the peal, in 30,968 different ways." He later estimated that, by changing the in and out of course as Holt had done—only twice in an extent—the 720 could be rung in 60,000 different ways.

## A Nostalgic Taste of Honey at Hayes

IT was in 1923 that the old six at Hayes, Middlesex, were last rung. Chiming may have taken place up to the outbreak of war, but there are few ringers left who remember what the old bells were like.

The tower has lain dilapidated ever since, until a year or two ago when extensive church restoration included the repointing of the tower. It was then that Percy Venn, himself in the building business, came to take an interest in the church. He rings at Hillingdon but lives in Hayes, and he volunteered to refit completely the inside of the tower and have the bells made into a ring of eight.

The old floors were in a dangerous condition and replacement was imperative. The first to go was the old clock chamber floor and, unfortunately, such is the march of progress that a staircase of antiquarian interest had to go with it - one of only six left in the country employing huge stiles with split logs as treads. A new clock chamber floor was installed 3 feet below the old one, being completed on Friday, March 14th. Work was to have started on dismantling the bells almost immediately, but Percy was away for the week-end and his son, Christopher, had other ideas. Why not try and ring the old six? After all, no one knew what they were like, and the repointed tower with its new floor was half the battle. A close inspection proved the frame to be still sound, and it was amazing that all the fittings were still intact as well, despite the floor beneath the bells having half fallen to

A small working party was formed on Sunday, March 16th, including another of Percy's sons. Tony. Its members laboured enthusiastically, and only three hours' work was necessary before all was ready for the try out. Drastic action had to be taken on the choked-up pulleys, but by the time enough ringers had arrived, and Frank and Tony Price had cast a weather eye over the situation, all the bells had been pulled up single-handed. The ease with which they handled was quite fantastic. From the first rounds we went straight into a course of Bob Minor for the 4.30 p.m. service and before ringing finished for the day Frank and Tony had rung two bells each to Grandsire Doubles, which proved the easy "go" without question. Having gone this far, a quarter peal was arranged for the following evening.

### TENOR CRACKED

The initial ringing over, we had time to reflect. We had expected the bells to be extremely noisy, but alas, they also proved to be sadly out of tune. The tenor did not have quite the same resonance as the others and an old rumour that she is cracked was found to be quite true when those who rang her last took a close look and discovered a crack in the crown. This finally put paid to any ideas Percy had about retaining her in the new ring. We concluded that the bells are too high in the tower and too heavy for it as well. Both 5 and tenor have a high arched frame at the end of their pits, and the arc of the tenor swing carries right into the wall, which has been

chiselled out for the purpose. This no doubt explains why her clapper has no flight as well. The back four (tenor 14 cwt.) are by Thomas Mears, 1795, with two trebles added by Warners in 1901.

Before the quarter some temporary covers were rigged over the gaps in the bell chamber floor, and with noise considerably reduced 1,440 Plain Bob Minor was scored without much difficulty in 52 minutes by P. S. Venn 1, R. A. Fardon 2, Patricia A. Copas 3, C. J. Venn 4, R. K. Russ 5, M. J. Palmer (cond.) 6.

Our taste of honey was complete, even if the bearings were fast drying up! The Vicar was delighted and so was Percy Venn, who couldn't resist the temptation to put off dismantling the bells for a few days and so give more people a chance to ring them. Word got round and recorders appeared to capture the last ringing on this old ring, suddenly given a final chance to fulfil the purpose for which it was made. Some ringing on Tuesday was followed by more on Thursday, when a touch of Cambridge Minor was rung for Confirmation service, conducted by the Bishop of Kensington.

It was on Sunday evening, March 23rd, that the old bells were heard for the last time, work on dismantling them starting the following day. A new light eight for Middlesex is just around the corner, hung 9 feet below its predecessors, and Percy Venn will be a proud man the day they ring from the tower to proclaim another chapter in the 1,000-year history of St. Mary's, Hayes. But for those who were privileged to give the old six bells their final breath after a silence of close on 50 years that nostalgic taste of honey will remain.

### REVIEW

### A TUTOR'S HANDBOOK, PART 1, BELL CONTROL TO PLAIN HUNTING

Issued under the authority of the Central Council. 1969. 3/-

One's first reaction is to say that this book is worth learning by heart. If this seems a bit too much at least one can say that every word is worth careful reading and thought. It is not a book for learners, though no doubt they would profit by reading it, and doing so would help them realise what it means to be an instructor and so to sympathise with him. But it is, very definitely, a book for every instructor and would-be instructor, and there must be few indeed, however experienced, who need learn nothing from its pages.

Part 1 is written by Mr. Wilfrid Moreton and Part 2, to be out in a few months' time, by Mr. Norman Chaddock, on behalf of the Sunday Service and Education Committee of the Council. The excellent photos of right and wrong methods are by Mr. J. N. D. Chaddock and the illustrations of the Launton silencers are by Mr. D. Hughes. Other prominent ringers have given valued help and advice.

Two sentences in the book might be described as implied refrains running right through it: "Insistence on a high standard from the beginning is vital, particularly for what is, after all, a public performance", and "It is doubtful whether sufficient attention is given to this method of learning."

The would-be instructor must answer several preliminary questions before beginning work. How best to use the time; how to maintain interest, how many pupils to have at any time; what bells to use . . . . He must be patient, a skilled ringer with a sense of style himself, and always use a silenced bell. The learner should be given a general picture of the Exercise, by attending on Sundays, by seeing what happens in the bell chamber, and how it relates to work in the ringing room. He must learn how to stand, how to hold the rope, and its length must be right. Safety and discipline are vital. Not until then can he begin to learn, and the stages up to full control are carefully detailed. No less than 41 faults, with their cures, are detailed. All this may give a superficial impression that learning takes a long time. On the contrary, the better the instructor knows the 18 close-packed pages the more speedily yet thoroughly will his pupils progress.

There follow several pages on the next stage—up to Plain Hunting. The tutor must have a scheme for the pupil and a minimum standard at every stage. Call-changes are deemed a worthy step in the process. Now is the time to learn to dodge without "clipping" and to learn that natural accuracy which sets the rest of the band at ease and the absence of which can drive them mad. Now is the time to learn what to do when in every place, hunting up or down, and conversely the common faults to avoid.

Details about raising and lowering and 17 suggestions for teaching a completely new band complete a brilliant 35 pages.

This book should be in every tower where it is hoped that the succession of learners will be maintained through the years. And no doubt the same will apply to Part 2, when it appears.

### MR. ALBERT HURST

The death on January 2nd of Mr. Albert Hurst at the age of 72 was a sad loss to Little Shelford, Cambridgeshire. For many years he had been captain and it was largely through him that the bells have continued to be rung for Sunday services.

He started as a ringer in 1933, when Charlie Cook persuaded a group of men to join together to form a band. Albert Hurst became captain and he was always proud of the fact that he rang the tenor to the first recorded peal on the bells, 5,040 Grandsire Triples. It was mainly through his efforts that the bells were augmented to six, and his only regret was that he had been unable to do this sooner.

Members of the Ely Diocesan Association rang a short touch on the bells after the funeral and a quarter peal of Grandsire, conducted by Derek Sibson, was rung during the evening as a tribute to his memory.

## Letters to the Editor

### METHOD CLASSIFICATION

Dear Sir, — In this day and age there seems to be throughout the Exercise a certain snob value in ringing Surprise methods -why? It seems to me that there are many hundreds of perfectly good methods, parti-cularly in the Major field, which will never be rung merely because they do not happen to have at least one internal place made every time the treble crosses from one dodging position to the next within the half realise that the complexity of a method is supposed to depend upon which-ever class it may belong to; however, whereas it is true that no Surprise method should be called simple, it is certainly not true that all treble bob methods are of a simple construction after the manner of Oxford and Kent.

I have been puzzled for some time now as to the origin of the definitions of these various method classes (Surprise, Delight, Exercise, etc.) and I cannot imagine where they came from, what they are for, or why we have to have them! I therefore beg to suggest what I believe is a more rational system of method classification, using the same names, maintaining most of the wellknown methods with the names they already have and yet giving the average ringer information about the method which might actually be of use to him. As follows:-

- Let all plain methods in which seconds place is made at the lead end be called BOB methods.
- (ii.) Let all plain methods in which no internal place is made at the lead end be called COURT BOB methods.
- (iii.) Let all treble bob methods in which no internal place is made at the lead end be called TREBLE BOB methods.
- (iv.) Let all treble bob methods in which reconds place is made at the lead end be called SURPRISE methods.
- (v.) Let all little plain methods be called LITTLE BOB or LITTLE COURT BOB methods, depending upon the type of lead end as in (i) and (ii).
- (vi.) Let all little treble bob methods be called LITTLE TREBLE BOB or LITTLE SURPRISE methods, depending upon the type of lead end as per (iii.) and (iv.).
- (vii.) Let all alliance methods, regardless of which place is made at the lead end, be called ALLIANCE methods.
- (viii.) Let all methods with more than one hunt bell, and all principles used as methods, remain unclassified as unclassified as Grandsire and Stedman are now.

The only notable changes which would occur would be that Bristol Surprise Major would become Bristol Treble Bob Major, and Norwich Surprise Minor would become Norwich Treble Bob Minor: also methods such as Reverse Bob would have to be renamed.—Yours sincerely,

CARTER TRIPLES

Dear Sir,—1 very much appreciated your interest in putting into the "R.W." my appeal for touches of Carter Triples. To date I have only had one reply, from J. G. Hawkins, of Westminster, but having exchanged three letters the following has come to light:

Carter Doubles as given in Snowdon's diagrams and from which I made my extension to Carter Triples is, according to Collection of Doubles Methods by the C.C., Reverse Carter Doubles, although the start is different. Mr. Hawkins sent me the figures for Carter Triples and Reverse Carter Triples, but the method I had devised was neither of these but a variation of the Reverse Carter Triples which Mr. Hawkins has named Roberts Triples.

Using the start in the Doubles Collection

The advantage of my variation is that the Reverse Carter "Slow" shown under Carter Doubles in "Diagrams", whereby there are two snap leads 15 changes apart, is maintained on "the front". All the dodging is done in 45 and 67 which is more usual in Triples methods. The division heads are the Bob Major lead heads with each bell number reduced by one to suit bells 1 to 7 instead of 2 to 8.

I believe that a proven composition of Carter Triples may be adapted to fit the other two methods above, and I again ask you to appeal for the figures of a peal of Carter Triples if you think my observations would evoke interest.—Yours sincerely,

## Liverpool University Society Dinner

AGING blizzards, torrential rain and gale-force winds failed to prevent scores of addicts of the art from converging on Liverpool for the University Society's eighth annual dinner, which epic undertaking was ably organised by Dr. J. J. Fox

As has become customary, activities began on the Friday evening, February 21st, with the arrival of visitors for the practices at St. Francis Xavier's, St. Nicholas' (Pier Head) and the Pig and Whistle. At Pier Head Mr. E. C. Birkett kindly handed over the practice to the Society, and with the reunion of so many past members and friends we were able to ring methods ranging up to Cambridge Maximus.

Saturday dawned early for some. Mr. Joe Ridyard, Cathedral Ringing Master, had some time previously invited the Society to attempt a Dinner Day peal at the Cathedral, and this began at 9.30. Stedman Cinques was successfully conducted by Mr. Cyril Crossthwaite in the "short" time of 4.17 and Miss Susan Cowan, who rang the second, thus became the first lady to ring a peal on the bells. Meanwhile another peal attempt of Yorkshire Surprise Major, arranged by Mr. Martin Snape for the visitors at Southport Emmanuel, was unfortunately lost after an hour's good striking.

For non-peal ringers, five local towers were open. The first of these was Halewood (8) at 11.30, and the interval between ringing here and at Woolton at 1.30 saw the consumption by the "Ravenous Resident Ringers" of large quantities of pies and curried chips in a Woolton bus shelter—they obviously could not wait for the dinner! Breathing fire, we then descended on the towers of Woolton (8), Childwall (6) and, once more, St. Nicholas' (12) and S.F.X. (8).

The dinner was held for the second consecutive year at Bedford House, where a really excellent five-course meal was enjoyed by all.

### HONOUR FOR MR. RIDYARD

Following the loyal toast to the Duke of Lancaster the Master, Mr. Geoffrey Sparling, announced that a referendum of the Society had unanimously approved the proposal that Mr. Joe Ridyard, a long-standing friend of the Society, be elected an honorary life member. This news was greeted with applause and it was noted that Joe was already sitting with the "terrible twins", Mr. Alec Martin and Mr. Tudor Edwards, so they now become a trio.

The Master then proposed the toast of "The Church" and in reply the Dean of the Anglican Cathedral, the Very Rev. Edward H. Stephen Pedley and Miss Mary Macdonald on their engagement, and past member Mr. Dave Keast (in his absence) on achieving his ambition of going to India.

The formal proceedings over, the rest of the evening was spent in the lounge renewing old friendships.

### An Appreciation

From time to time there appears in our journal an obituary of a non-ringer—some-body near and dear to the hearts of ringers who has shown an interest in the tower's activities.

Such a person was Kenneth Rutherford, a keen musician who in his younger days played in a famous London orchestra. He took a keen and lively interest in the High-clere band, and although his wife, son and daughter learned to handle a bell he was content to watch from the sideline.

But he did more than just watch. He entertained us every New Year's Eve to a meal and social evening before ringing the old year out, joined us on our outlings, became our official photographer (as can be seen in the belfry) and was indeed just one of us over many years.

We learned of his sudden death on March 6th, and such was his popularity that we arranged a half-muffled peal on the evening prior to the funeral. Only three such peals have been rung at Highclere in 99 years, the two previous being for the captain and vice-captain of the tower.

A quarter peal with the bells half-muffled was also arranged for the Sunday evening following his death. The method was Winchester Bob Minor, the first recorded quarter peal in the method, and the ringers were B. Doe 1, D. Goss 2, P. Furness 3, M. Goss 4, R. Crocker 5, G. K. Dodd (cond.) 6.

Reg Rex was specially asked to ring in the memorial peal as he served under Kenneth Rutherford in the local Scout troop, when it boasted of having the best bugle band in the area. His memory will remain with us at Highelere. G. K. D.

### MR. SEDMAN HEWITT STEEL

The York Minster Society has lost its oldest member by the sudden death of "Syd" Steel. He was 69 and rang as usual on March 23rd but had to be taken to hospital on the following day suffering from pneumonia. Unfortunately he died early on March 26th.

"Syd" learned to ring at Whitby, where his father was a ringer. He moved to York in 1922 and was elected a Minster ringer in 1923. He joined the Yorkshire Association in 1922 and was Ringing Master for the Eastern District from 1946 to 1961. Peal ringing did not appeal to him very much and he only rang 40 for the Association.

The funeral service was in the Minster and was followed by cremation.

## TWO CENTURIES AGO AT DERBY

### A Ringing Tour: March 15th, 1769

Any resemblance between the sponsored charity ringing tour organised on March 15th, 1969, by the Derby Diocesan Association and that reported below is purely fictitious.

And word went out to all the Diocese that a grand ringing tour was to be held on Saturday, March 15th. And on the appointed day a goodly company of ringers, some threescore and ten, assembled 'neath the shadow of the great Cathedral Tower in the County Town of Derby. Many had journeyed from distant parts of the Diocese such as Chesterfield, Long Eaton and Sawley, to take part in this great pilgrimage, never before known in the history of bellringing. Each ringer, well stocked with victuals for the day, was dressed in a manner befitting the rigours of winter and with stout footwear.

Details of the day's venture were distributed among the assembled company, and after a few kind words from a cathedral dignitary, and under the watchful eye of the Constable, the gallant 70 set forth in a north-westerly direction on the 16-mile marathon tour.

### MASTER AND DOG

The first obstacle to negotiate was the dangerous River Derwent, where flooding had weakened the ancient ford. Thence with a brisk pace, and led by the redoubtable Ringing Master of Pinxton, with his dog, Judy, the band made for the distant spire of Breadsall. Here a total of 1,149 changes were rung in masterly fashion in methods ranging from Grandsire Doubles to Plain Bob Minor.

After Breadsali came Horsley, some four miles distant, which is famous for its annual ringing contest. This treacherous route came near to claiming the lives of some of the pilgrims. Intent on getting to Horsley on time they ventured upon a shorter route and unhappily fell into a quagmire. They were rescued by the timely intervention of those following, but even so several of these poor unfortunates were covered above their ankles with evil-smelling mire.

### A FINE BROTH

After ringing on the unsurpassed six bells at Horsley, those intent on sustenance entered the village and at the meeting place sampled a fine broth prepared by local ringers, under the direction of one called Gwen. Replenished, the company strode off in divers directions—some eastward by a longer route to attempt a ring on the six bells at Denby, and others westward to the ancient parish of Duffield to try their skill on the magnificent bells numbering half a score, which vie with Derby Cathedral and Chesterfield's twisted spire for pride of place.

As dusk fell the weary pilgrims entered upon the last stage of the tour—the long walk back to the County Town of Derby. Arriving there late in the evening they assembled to partake of a sumptuous repast. A stock of the day's venture was taken, as each ringer participating had been sponsored, and the goodly sum of 290 golden sovereigns is expected to be gathered towards the cost of repairing the ancient Cathedral.

The unanimous opinion of the day was that it will be a long time before the horse-drawn carriage is used on such ringing tours.

### **OBITUARY**

### MR. E. SPILLER

The death of Mr. Ernest Spiller at the age of 86 on March 7th meant the passing of a ringer who had been a continuing link between generations of ringers at All Saints', Maidstone, over the last 70 years.

He was taught to handle a bell towards the end of the last century at the Parish Church and rang his first peal there in 1903; this was Stedman Triples and was conducted by Alfred Palmer. He was never a prolific peal ringer: the few he rang were mostly of Stedman and conducted by Louis Head.

It was fitting, therefore, that a half-muffled quarter peal of Stedman Triples should be rung on the back eight at All Saints' immediately following the funeral service on March 14th. Many of his old friends rang, including Louis Head, who conducted the quarter peal.

Ernest Spiller was a true Maidstone gentleman, upright and outspoken. He was captain of the Maidstone band from 1923 until 1948 and earned respect for his esteem and diplomatic approach to everyone. Although poor health prevented him from ringing in recent months, he never lost contact with old and young friends and always kept up with the latest news.

As a bookbinder he was a first-class craftsman and served the same firm of printers for 60 years before retiring in 1956. On warm, sunny days one would often find Ernie at his favourite spot just down the steps from the church and by the river he loved.

Writing to the first number of the Peterborough Guild News, Sylvia Martin makes this very useful suggestion:—

"As a relative newcomer to the art of bellringing, my memories of ringing from the 'outside' are still fairly fresh, and I would, therefore, like to voice a protest against the all-too-common habit of using the Sunday service ringing as an additional practice. Although this may in some towers be the only time when the whole team meets together, it should still be remembered that the congregation on their way to church, and those living nearby, do not know the team of ringers is attempting a complicated method or just call-changes. All they know is the difference between well-struck bell music and clashing discord; and surely the former should be our aim no matter how simple the method needs to be for it to be attained."
