

Church of St. Mary the Virgin, Mortlake

To those outside the borough, Mortlake is probably best known as the finishing point of the University Boat Race and for the brewery which stands conspicuously on the Surrey shore just before the finish. The Parish Church of what is now the parish of Mortlake with East Sheen stands back a little way from the river, just east of the brewery. It has stood there since 1543, though the history of the church and parish goes back much earlier; the Archbishops of Canterbury held a manor house at Mortlake long before the Norman Conquest.

The derivation of the name is obscure and it has at varying times been spelt in 19 different ways. Ecclesiastically, the history starts with the granting of a licence for a chapel of ease by Edward III in 1348. It stood a few hundred yards west of the present site, alongside the Manor House, which continued to be used by the Archbishops until Cranmer passed it over to Thomas Cromwell. On Cromwell's fall from favour Henry VIII gave it to Katherine Parr, and it was one or other of these owners who apparently decided on certain alterations which were impeded by the presence of the chapel, so the latter was removed to the present site in 1543.

Henry VIII's mania for changes seems to have infected the parishioners for in subsequent years they could seldom leave their church in peace, so that today nothing but the tower remains. In the late 16th century a vestry was built and still survives. Used for many years as a school, the upper storey, following a restoration last year, now forms a very useful parish room. It would appear from surviving descriptions of the church by visitors that by the middle of the last century the interior left much to be desired, and evidently the parishioners agreed for plans for a complete rebuilding were prepared by Sir Arthur Blomfield. The chancel of the Parish Church was rebuilt to his designs in 1885, but it was not until 1905/6, after Sir Arthur's death, that the final plunge was taken and the nave and south aisle were completely rebuilt.

There are, however, plentiful reminders of the earlier church, chief amongst them being a fine example of a 15th century octagonal stone font presented to the original chapel by Cardinal Thomas Bouchier, Archbishop of Canterbury from 1454-1486. There are three ancient chests, the finest being one of German or Italian manufacture of the late 15th century, and the vestry records are very nearly complete from 1578.

LADDERS FOR STONE STAIRCASE
Throughout the years from 1543 the tower survived without too many alterations, a particularly unfortunate one being the removal for some reason about 1840 of the stone staircase, leaving a rather unnerving succession of ladders to be ascended by future generations of ringers. Of the bells, the earilest mention is in the inventory of the Commissioners of Edward VI in 1552, which left in the churchwardens' care three bells and a sauze bell. The history of bell ringing in the parish really starts in 1695, when the present brick belfry surmounted by the curious wooden cupola was added to the Tudor tower, giving the latter its present-day appearance.

Into this new belfry went a ring of five bells by Philip Wightman, and so far as can be traced they have never left the tower since. They cost £150, part of the parish being mortgaged to finance the expenditure. They form the present numbers 3, 4, 5, 7 and 8 and are plain castings without any decoration or inscriptions except for "Made by Philip Wightman" followed by the date, 1694, except for the tenor which is dated 1695.

A vestry minute dated 18th July, 1703, reads that "for adding three bells to ye church and repairs £180 was expended. The Garter property was charged with payment." In contrast to Wightman's original five, the new bells were distinctly unsuccessful, none lasting 50 years. In 1746 Theodore Eccleston came to the rescue and presented two new bells cast by Thomas Lester at Whitechapel. One of these bells, the No. 2, survives and bears the simple inscription: "Theodore Eccleston Esqr. Thos. Lester of London made me 1746". The fate of the two old trebles is not known.

Eccleston was a member of the Ancient Society of College Youths from 1744 and became Master in 1750. He died in 1753 and was buried at Mortlake on January 14th, 1753. It is of interest to note that 1746 was the year of his marriage at Mortlake and that at the same time he also presented two bells to All Saints'. Fulham.

It was not long before the other 1703 bell gave trouble, to quote the present inscription of the No. 6: "Recast by subscription of the ringers. Rt. Catin fecit 1751." Even then troubles were not ended for in 1784 Eccleston's treble had to be recast by Thomas Janaway.

So the bells remain to this day. The weights are uncertain but the tenor is something over 14 cwt., a large ring for rather a small tower; the belfry is barely 11 feet square, and it is a decidedly tight fit between the larger bells. The present iron frame was fitted in 1911 and they were rehung on ball-bearings in 1954. Finally, only last year, the clappers were completely restored and refitted with independent staples. All these various repairs have been carried out by the Whitechapel Foundry.

REPAINTED PEAL BOARD ERROR

Of the actual ringing, few details have survived. Only 46 peals have been rung and only four of these are recorded on peal boards. There were a lot more which unfortunately "disappeared" without trace or record some years ago. The four survivors are all in poor condition but at least their details are recorded and two are of some interest. One bears the date in Roman figures of 1761, but from recent correspondence with Canon Felstead it is apparent that at some time it was repainted and a Roman "X" was mistaken for a "L", so in fact it records the first peal rung on the bells by the Mortlake Society on November 22nd, 1721, 5040 Bob Major Trebles (Bob Triples) in 3 hours 4 minutes and, to quote the board: "This is the third time this peal was ever rung and the first by the method designed and called by William Walker."

Walker rang the 6th on that occasion and many years later his name appears as the ringer of the 7th in a peal of 10,640 Bob Major rung by the Society of College Youths on August 2nd, 1776. This peal came round in 6½ hours. The other two boards record another peal by the College

Youths in 1823 and one by the Junior College Society in 1829. The great period for peals was between 1891 and 1894, when 13 were rung; but since then they have been very scarce, only one being rung between the World Wars and four since 1945.

However, service ringing continued throughout this period and notable among the ringers were Henry Bullen and his son Tom, both of whom completed 60 years as ringers. It is probably a gross libel of the ringers, but from the memories of older parishioners it appears that some of the band are remembered more for the alacrity with which they made their way after ringing from the church to the nearby "Old George"! Times change. Those ringers have long since gone to their rest, and now the "Old George" has gone, demolished to make the road wider.

make the road wider.

Since the Second World War and the death of Tom Bullen it has not been easy to keep a band going, due in the main to a dire shortage of experienced ringers, something essential on bells like Mortlake on which it is not easy for the inexperienced to attain an acceptable standard of striking. The present band had its foundation in 1963 after a period of only intermittent ringing. After reaching the stage of ringing occasional quarter peals for services, it is now beginning to suffer from the effects of business and educational commitments, so the immediate future is 4 little uncertain.

EXAMINATION OF PROCEDURE

Have the seeds been sown for the reorganisation of the Central Council by the notice of motion submitted by Mr. Douglas A. R. May, Master of the Guildford Diocesan Guild? His motion was carried after an amendment which did not disturb the principle at stake.

But who is to make the investigation? The proposer wanted a new committee and not the Standing Committee. The Council favoured the Standing Committee and then decided to ballot for the new committee. Mr. May was an unsuccessful candidate: in fact it was very much the old brigade back on the Committee.

Will a special meeting of the Standing Committee be called to consider the principles at stake? This year's committee meeting lasted nearly three hours. It will be for the President and the officers to decide how adequate consideration can be given to the questions raised.

The motion in Mr. May's name read:-This Council instructs the Standing Committee to examine the constitution of Council and to make recommendations with a

view to ensuring that the business of the Council, particularly at its annual meeting, is completed in a satisfactory manner."

Proposing the motion, Mr. May said that after the last Council meeting he wrote an article which was published in "The Ringing World". It was critical of many aspects of the Council's procedure, but no one came to the support of the status quo. Many non-members told him that they thought the Council was irrelevant to the needs of the Exercise. This was not true, and it was unfortunate that many people felt that way.

After pointing out that the annual meeting was all-important to the Exercise, Mr. May said that the time given to the Council's busisaid that the time given to the Council's busi-ness should be increased so that discussions and debates did not have to be guillotined. The main purpose of the motion, if carried, would be to take steps to bring the Council's operations up-to-date, relating them to the needs of the Exercise, and to make it apparent to the ordinary ringer that the Council had its priorities right. He asked the following ques-

NINE QUESTIONS

(1) Is the meeting at the right end of the week-end and, in particular, should it be on a Tuesday?

(2) Is sufficient time allowed or should it

span two days

(3) Should there be a one-day half-yearly meeting either in Birmingham or London? On occasions in the past a matter had been re-ferred to a committee and when the committee reported back it was rejected and a year was

(4) Should topics requiring a decision, especially technical matters, he referred to the committees as now constituted or would it be better to form committees in the Parliamenary sense which would sit during a Council meet-

ing and report back to the same meeting?
(5) Was the Council too unwieldy? Should membership be reduced to make it an efficient memership be reduced to make it an efficient debating chamber that it probably was at inception? If so, how should the reduction be achieved? Apart from the two ancient London Societies, there was little justification for non-territorial Societies to be represented because their membrs were also represented by territorial Societies to be represented by territorial Societies to the societies of the soc torial Societies. Should Societies not requiring an annual subscription have their number of representatives decided upon in a different way? Should the number of honorary members be reduced?

(6) Should the President chair the meetings or should a chairman be elected annually?

(7) Should everyone be entitled to speak as

long as he likes or as often as he could catch the President's eye?

(8) The Monday ringing arrangements had not received wide publicity this year. Should the procedure be continued or even extended to the rest of the week-end?

(9) Should local dignitaries be asked to welcome the Council? He suspected that most of them felt as much a duty to agree to do so as they felt to listen,

During the last session a little patching-up of Council procedure had been performed, but he was sure that much could be gained from thorough investigation into the Council's working Those responsible should look to the future and not to the past, seeing from an impartial distance rather than the obscurity of close proximity.

Mr. W. Viggers seconded.

RECEPTION ON MONDAY EVENING

Mr. W. F. Moreton said the Yorkshire Association had been thinking about some of the points Mr. May had made in relation to the meeting next year and it was proposed that the reception be held not after the meeting but on the Monday evening. The Council would then be able to start at 9.30 and not restricted to finishing at 4.30. Mr. C. F. Mew (

Mew (Surrey Association) moved as an amendment that the Council appoint a committee to examine the position and not put it on the shoulders of the Standing Committee

as many of its members were fully occupied with other Council matters. Mr. May had expressed a willingness to sit on such a com-

He continued that the members were there three main reasons: to collect information to be disseminated among Associations: to improve relations with the Church and to look after the practical side. The people who elected them might not understand the technical jargon, but they looked to them as leaders of the Exercise to do their best for them. "We must always be willing to be progressive and to change our ways as are necessary.

The Rev. St. John Smith (Derby Diocesan Association) supported Mr. Mew's amendment for two reasons The majority of the members of the Standing Committee were too busy with other committees and the Standing Committee was too large.

It was agreed to amend the motion to in-Standing Committee to appoint small ad hoe committee (ad hoe meaning that the committee would disperse as soon as the

work had been done).

Mi P. A. Corby (Kent) supported the motion because it was intended to do a little investigation into one's private life. His criticism of the previous speakers was that they had not made any suggestions as to what they wanted to do with the extra time.

He felt that the Council had four main ob-

(a) To promote Sunday and other ringing required by the Church

(b) To promote change-ringing as an art.

(c) To promote social contact.

(d) To provide links with the past and maintain an historical continuity,

They had a duty to elect a new Standing Committee. If they thought they were a lot of old dodderers it was their duty to elect the right one. It was the duty of the Standing

right one. It was the duty of the Standing Committee to look at the constitution.

Mr. Philip Gray (ANZAB) believed it was something like 20 years since the Council looked through its rules. He was sure it was not true that the same rules had remained since the Council's inception. After an interval of 20 years, when the people on the Council

had almost changed completely, it was necessary to have another check. He supported a motion of this kind,

He would ask the proposer to amend the motion as it implied criticism. The Council could not be asked to vote for something that implied criticism of themselves. The motion should read: "This Council instructs the Standing Committee to examine the constitu-tion of the Council and methods of proce-

This was accepted by Mr. May Mr. T. Lock (Middlesex) suggested that each member body be asked to send in their gestions within six months to be considered by the Standing Committee. It would be more representative of ringers as a whole.

The amendment appointing an ad hoc committee was defeated, but the motion incor-porating Mr. Gray's amendment was carried.

THE MINUTES

The minutes of the Worcester meeting, which had been circulated were adopted. Mr. R. L. Roper asked if they could be circulated a little earlier. The hon, secretary replied that he had nothing to guide him except precedent.

This gives a grand total of 3,455. Interesting comparisons can be made from the other figures and fists in our report. There were 543 first pealers and 79 first as conductor, as reported in "The Ringing World". In the table below it will be seen that Kent County and the Chester Guild have exchanged positions from last year, but an ordinary look

Toggue-tied Critics over "Ringing World" Report

For the past four years the reception of the report of "The Ringing World" Committee has given rise to very critical debates. This year there was a complete absence of criticism and not a single question was raised.

The report gave an admirable survey of the past three years of the 26th Council, revealing a 17 per cent, increase in space and 7.7 per cent, increase in sales,

Financially it was not a good year, with a loss of £966, which was aggravated by a bad debt of £518. The forecast for the coming year is that the journal will break even.

THE REPORT

The 26th Council has seen great changes in "The Ringing World", and at the end of this Council's term it is worth placing some of these on record.

In 1966 the standard paper was 16 pp. and only one issue had a coloured cover, but this idea has been developed to where 20 pp. and a coloured cover is the standard, as the table

1966: 1 coloured, 51 white, total pages 868, average 16.7 pp. per week.

1967: 28 coloured, 24 white, total pages 960, average 18.5 pp. per week.

1968: 46 coloured, 6 white, total pages 1,016. average 19.5 pp. per week.

(An average increase in space of 17% from 1966 to 1968.)

The average weekly sales in the three years have been: 1966, 5.646: 1967, 5.878: 1968, 6.081: an increase of 7.7%.

In 1968 the figure for the first half was 6.150 and for the second half it fell to 6.012 after the price increase. For the first ten issues of 1969 the average has been 5.907 and we are encouraged that the loss so far does not ex-ceed 250. The reduction is almost entirely on supplies through newsagents as Rolls House ordered more than sales to cope with contingencies. Our figures are actual sales.

Improvements cost money, and the accounts show the combined effects of more coloured issues, more pages, increases in basic printing costs and the increase in postal charges in September, 1968. Costs nave already gone up again from March, 1969. Income has had to be increased by raising the charges for notices and advertisements and the price of the paper itself was raised to 1 - in July, 1968. The investment policy has been reviewed and further adjustments have been made since the 1968 acjustments have been made since the 1968 accounts were completed. The effects of these changes showed through to some extent in the second half-year. As reported at Worcester the draft accounts by the Auditor for January to April, 1968, showed a loss of £458 and, on to April, 1968, showed a loss of £458 and, on this basis, it may reasonably be assumed that the loss for the first half of 1968 would be about £750 when additional costs were taken into consideration. The figure for the whole of 1968, less the bad debt referred to below, means that the second-half made a surplus of £700 to the control of the control £300 in the opinion of our Auditor.

GENEROUS SUPPORT

The financial position of 'The Ringing World' would be much worse but for the generous donations that many people continue to send. Quarter peal ringers contributed well over half the donations for 1968 and, in addition, there were special donations of £310 from voluntary payments by 600 people of the increased rates on unexpired postal subscriptions. At the time of writing further special dona-tions totalling £112 have been received in 1969. Our sincere thanks are expressed to all these kind donors.

In June, 1968, Rolls House gave notice that they would cease trading because of difficulties with their accommodation. At very short notice Mr. W. G. Wilson and the Editor, with the willing co-operation of the "Surrey Adversiese", negotiated alternative arrangements which have continued the circulation through newsagents without interruption and have given us a slightly higher proportion of the revenue from those sales. We are now our own pub-

Unfortunately, Rolls House were not completely frank in their reason for closing down and in September, 1968, a statutory meeting of creditors was held. Mr. W. G. Wilson and our Auditor attended that meeting. On hearing that a very large claim of over £30,000 had been lodged, although vigorously disputed by Rolls House, the committee agreed unani-mously that "The Ringing World" claim of £518 should be written-off as a had debt in the 1968 accounts. It is not possible at this stage to say what, if any, dividend will be received.

STAFF CENTRED AT GUILDFORD Mr. T. W. White has continued his untiring efforts as Editor throughout. He has also set up a shadow organisation to cope with emergencies but no permanent successor has yet been found. The Accountant's duties were taken over by Mr. C. W. Lucas after the death of Mr. Jeater. This new arrangement, which has brought all the work under one roof at Guildford, has been of material help to the Editor. Mr. Lucas readily took on the extra work on accounts that was entailed in becoming our own publishers. Mrs. Lucas has con-tinued to assist in the office work. All of them deserve our special thanks.

Mr. Jeater's death in May, 1968, cannot be allowed to pass without our written acknow-ledgment of his many years of faithful service as our Accountant, and to express our sympathy for his family. We are indebted to those who undertook responsibility for transferring his books and papers to Guildford

A milestone was reached in 1968 with issue

No. 3000 on October 18th, and we salute all the select and faithful band who have taken the paper from its first issue We are grateful to all subscribers, old and new, and to those who supply news and articles to fill the space that has been provided.

COMMITTEE 100%

Of the Committee itself, it may be noted that two major changes were introduced after the Council meeting at Bath in 1966 The size

of the Committee was increased and it began to meet more frequently. During the past three years the membership has varied between 3 and 6 and the total of meetings held has been 10. Since Worcester the present Committee of 10. Since Worcester the present Committee of 5 has met three times and attendance of elected members has been 100%. The Editor and Treasurer of "The Ringing World" and the Secretary of the Central Council have also been in almost 100% attendance throughout and the Vice-President of the Central Council has attended all the meetings in the past year.

On the basis of the 1968 Accounts, received in good time, a budget has been agreed for 1969. At the last meeting approval was given to the recommendations of the Auditor for improvements in the accounting system to provide easier interim checks on the financial

The Standing Committee recommended that Ringing Associations should seek representation on the Diocesan Advisory Committees in order to give advice and see that the interests of ringers were safeguarded.

Report of the Broadcasting and Television Committee for 1968

FROM the regional reports it would appear that there has been a falling-off in the use of bells on the air during this year, but one wonders whether we are being informed of all that happens. We do reiterate our plea of previous years that ringers in the towers concerned should inform this committee when their bells are broadcast so that the event can be recorded.

North Region.—The only bells noted have been those rung before some of the morning services broadcast by 1.T.V. The recorded epilogues mentioned in last years report were broadcast by Tyne-Tees T.V. in 1968—Canon Thurlow's remaining two appearing in July, and three by Denis Bayles on "My Job in the Church" in September. This region s nomination for the Christmas broadcast was accepted by the B.B.C. The outcome was a very satisfactory item from St. John's, Preston, to which proper thought in the organisation may well have made some contribution.

Ireland.—In March. Radio Eireann gave a feature item, "The Bell Invites Me", in which the bells of St. Anne's, Sheldon: St. Mary's (R.C.) Cathedral Cork: St. Finbarre's (I.C.) Cathedral. Cork, and Cobh Cathedral carillon were heard. Several members of the St. Finbarre's ringers were interviewed in the programme. Other bells heard on the air during the year were those of St. Patrick's Cathedral. Dublin.—muffled and open.—Christ Church Cathedral, Dublin, and St. Mary's, Limerick. This region's contribution to the Christmas bells programme came from St. Mark's, Dundela.

Scotland.—Most of the churches here from which services are broadcast have no bells, and therefore ringing in this region is not heard very often. Ringing at St. James'. Leith, was featured in a news—em by Scottish T.V. and the bells of this church were heard in the Christmas bells programme

Midland and East Anglia. — In this region television seems to have been the only medium to broadcast bells. B.B.C. interviewed M. J. Clack, aged 90, of Warhoys, in May and later G. E. Symonds, aged 93, after ringing a peal. On Anglia T.V. bells preceded the services broadcast from Yoxford Parish Church, Suffolk, and from St. Peter Mancroft, Norwich, The handbell ringers from Redenhall Secondary Modern School Norfolk, appeared in the programme "About Anglia" on Christmas Eve, In the Christmas programme Debenham provided some weli-struck Major ringing.

In the West region bells have been used much less than usual. They were heard preceding services broadcast from Sherborne Abbey on Radio 4. Trent Parish Church, Dorset, and Witheridge Parish Church, Devonhoth on World Service.

Wells Cathedral bells were heard for some minutes when shots of the Cathedral were on the screen at the time when the police were investigating thefts from the Cathedral. This heavy ten were recorded and broadcast prior to a service of carols on Christmas Eve, and Harry Sanger was invited to supervise the recordings. The bells were rung by a local band which included several young ringers who acquitted themselves quite creditably.

Wales.—Here we have reports of many more oscasions when bells were heard on the air. The B.B.C.'s "Songs of Praise" programme in January came from Ebbw Vale and was preceded for some minutes by Grandsire Doubles. As two of the ringers were needed in the choir only six of the bells could be rung. In June the 1.T.V. morning service was televised in Cheltenham Parish Church and from its tower came some 12-bell ringing. B.B.C. 2 visited St. David's in July to make a film of the Cathedral for showing at a later date. Shots were taken of the bells in motion and of the

ringers, and the producer featured the action of the hands of two of the ringers.

July 17th was the occasion of the enthronement of the new Archbishop of Wales, and B.B.C. televised the service. Viewers saw some good shots of Llandaff Cathedral and heard Stedman Caters being rung on the Cathedral bells. The commentator made mention of the fact that the conductor—Nicholas Simon—is the son of the Archbishop.

These bells were heard again on December 31st in the B.B.C.'s "The end of the year from Llandaff Cathedral". When the Archbishop in his address referred to the "sound of the bells" some good Grandsire Caters rang out for about two minutes.

Harlech T.V. programmes for New Year's Eve were introduced with good shots of bells ringing.

For the Christmas hells programme Cadoxton, Neath, provided some well-struck Stedman Doubles.

London.—In this region there is singularly little to report. There was the repeat at the end of the year of the "Blue Peter" programme filmed at All Saints'. Kingston, which sparked-off some correspondence in "The Ringing World". There have been two or three occasions when bells have been used very briefly as a background to a view of a cathedral or church.

It is significant that far more news of the broadcasting of bells has come from Wales than from any other region, and unless one is prepared to accept the conclusion that there is more interest in the Principality in bellringing than elsewnere, this must indicate that other regions do not report what happens. It is to be hoped that this will be remedied in tuture.

The Convener has had useful discussions with the B.B.C. regarding the Christmas bells programme, and particularly the use of bells to introduce Sunday morning broadcasts, and although at the time of writing this report no decision has been reached, there is reason to hope that changes will be effected in the near future.

GLOSSARY OF RINGING TERMS DEBATE

A motion proposing the publication of a booklet containing a glossary of technical ringing terms to supersede that previously published circa 1901 was proposed by Mr. C. F. Mew. He said that there was a list in the ringing handbook by Powell and also by Mr. Wilson. With the exception of Mr. Wilson's "On Conducting" there was no book containing an explanation of the terms used. When he was learning he had to go to two old ringers for an explanation of some of the technical terms used.

Mr. G. W. Shanks (London County) seconded.

Mr. P. Gray said the Tutor's Handbook had a good glossary of terms. It would be published by the Council and cover the terms of the motion.

Mr. W. G. Wilson (London County) supported the publication of a new glossary.

Mr. Norman Chaddock confirmed that all technical terms for beginners were explained in the Tutor's Handbook.

Mr. C. K. Lewis said ringing terms were often local and not national. The 1901 glossary had to be given away to get rid of it.

Mr. John Seager (Yorkshire) said it was important that what was published should be understood nationally. An agreed vocabulary was needed.

The Rev. J. G. M. Scott (Guild of Devonshire Ringers) warned the Council that among many Devon ringers a rise and 60 changes constituted a peal. They would not change their term.

There were only 39 votes in favour of the motion which was heavily defeated.

DEATH OF MR. J. SAXTON

OBITUARY

MRS. ELSIE L. HAIRS An appreciation

With the death on May 20th of Mrs. Elsic L. Hairs, wife of Frank I. Hairs and mother of Olive D. Barnett, there has passed on one of the most distinguished lady ringers of her generation and one who, in a ringing career which began 60 years ago, was one of the pioneers who showed that women could not only hold their own but outstrip many men in an activity which was then regarded as almost exclusively a male preserve.

Born at Guildford on October 22nd, 1892, the daughter of Frank Bennett, who himself rang 1.600 peals and is remembered by many as a most gifted all-round conductor, she learned to handle a bell at St. Alphege's, Greenwich. In her early years, however, her main interest was in handbell ringing; her first peal was Grandsire Triples on handbells on August 22nd. 1911. and she had rung 75 peals, including six of Stedman Cinques, before her first on tower bells, Stedman Caters at Hillingdon on May 1st. 1920. In all she rang 320 peals, the last being a handbell peal of Stedman Caters in which her husband also took part, on their golden wedding anniversary, January 15th, 1966, thus repeating a performance on their wedding day—a unique "double"

Mrs. Hairs was rightly proud of a number of the peals in which she took part. They included the first 10-bell peal by ladies. Stedman Caters at St. Clement Danes' in 1926, and the first all-ladies peal of Surprise. Cambridge Major at Crayford in 1928. She was the first lady to take part in a peal of Surprise on handbells, ringing 1-2 to Superlative Major in 1923, and among her other handbell peals were Carter's Odd-Bob Stedman Triples and an 8.099 of Grandsire Caters. One of her most cherished possessions was a letter from Sir Arthur Heywood congratulating her on her handbell ringing at the social after the Central Council meeting in 1912.

On tower bells she was, in June, 1924, the first lady to ring in a peal of Cambridge Maximus. One of her early tower bell peals was of Grandsire Triples by four married couples, and later she and her husband took part in a similar peal of Cambridge Royal. Her last was one of Bob Major in March, 1962, when she was in her 70th year, arranged so that she could ring a peal with her grand-daughter, now Jean Woolford.

Apart from peal ringing she was for some years secretary of the Central District of the Ladies' Guild, of which she was a founder member. For a number of years she was peal secretary of the Sussex County Association and more recently represented that Association on the Central Council. At different times she was secretary of the Southern and the Northern Districts She was extremely proud of her membership of the College Youths, to which Society she was elected in 1917, and the last ringing function she attended was the College Youths' Dinner in November last.

The funeral took place at Withyham Church on May 23rd, conducted by the Rector, the Rev. Peter Scott, a member of the local band, in the presence of a representative gathering of ringers and other friends. Among those present were Messrs, R. V. Johnson and A. R. Baldock (Master and secretary of the Sussex County Association); Miss Joan Beresford

(treasurer), representing the Ladies' Guild, and Air Cdre. J. S. Mason. representing the Ancient Society of College Youths. Others included Mrs. A. Richardson and Mr. and Mrs. J. Wayman (Surfleet), Mr. and Mrs. P. J. Staniforth (Leicester), Mr. and Mrs. P. A. Corby. Mr. and Mrs. P. J. Staniforth (Leicester), Mr. and Mrs. P. A. Corby. Mr. and Mrs. S. J. Ladd, Messrs. G. Francis, A. E. Laker and W. Rogers, together with Mr. and Mrs. E. Osbon Mr. and Mrs. R. Harris, Mr. and Mrs. E. Parkyns and Messrs. R. D. Divall, R. Osbon and Miss R. Heighes, of the Withyham band. The bells were rung half-muffled before and after the service, and a course of Grandsire Triples was rung on handbells at the graveside by P. A. Corby 1–2, Mrs. P. J. Staniforth 3–4, W. H. Dobbie 5–6 and W. Rogers 7–8.

Mr. Stanton was a quiet and unassuming man with a sense of humour. Always a dignified countryman of a type rapidly disappearing, he was highly esteemed in all the circles in which he moved, and will be greatly missed. He rarely missed ringing for Sunday services, practices and local meetings.

The funeral service at St. Owen's, where Fred Stanton worshipped regularly and at which he was also a sidesnian, took place on May 15th and was conducted by the Vicar, the Rev. D. T. Evans; it was followed by interment in the adjoining churchyard. The bells were rung half-muffled afterwards by members of Bromham and Kempston bands, and on the following evening a half-muffled quarter peal of Plain Bob Triples was rung to his memory.

Mr. and Mrs. Stanton recently celebrated their golden wedding. He is survived by a widow, four sons and two daughters.

SUITABLE FOR HANDBELLS

Dear Sir.-I have been surprised at the rumpus created by John Mayne's letter on the composition of handbell peals: I am sure he did not intend to disparage anyone's performances or discourage anybody. But I must say that to apply the label "suitable for handbells" to a composition seems to me to be the result of muddled thinking. What is really meant is that such a composition is easier to ring than some others. Any composition is "suitable for bandbells" provided the band is good enough to ring it.

If Alan Scholfield will read John Mayne's

letter again he will see that he has misquoted it in his last parargpah. I see no reason why everyone should be able to ring all pairs, any more than that a member of an orchestra should be compelled to learn every instrument! Having, in my time, done a certain amount of fiddling round the front. I now prefer to beat the big drum.

Finally if, as Robert Smith aserts, compositions with 3-4 and 5-6 coursing are more musical than others, why not label such peals "suitable for tower bells" and have done with it?

I intend that our next peal shall have the footnote "Unsuitable for handbells. Not so hard as Cambridge Maximus."—Yours sincerely.

IRREGULAR MINOR METHODS

Dear Sir, I am afraid Mr. Dodd is on the wrong track when he upbraids Mr. Brian Mills for "having to change the name of an old method when they ring it to a (p. 423). At its meeting at St. Albans this Whitsun the Central Council officially endorsed the tradition that the first band to ring an extent of a Minor method, or to include it in a peal, has the sole right to name it, and this tradition Mr. Mills has been careful to follow.

I have already compiled extensive records of Minor methods and ringing, on behalf of the Council's Records Committee and. as I recently pointed out in these columns. this information is at the disposal of anyone who cares to contact me. The list of methods and names that appeared with Mr. Mills' peal at Holme Pierrepont was indeed first sent to me for checking, and I suggested that the previous history of Winthorpe and Blidworth should be given. In order to simplify other people's record-

On a point of detail, the correct name of "King Edward" (rather than "Keston") was established by a peal at Wath-on-Dearne in 1927, while the correct name for "Queen Victoria" is Sprotborough; the latter method has never been known as Queen Victoria—apart, that is, from Mr. Dodd's peal at Beenham last May. The entry in Chant's valuable Index of Minor Methods

is incorrect.—Yours sincerely.
