St. James' Church Hartlebury, Worcs.

HARTLEBURY has always been an episcopal parish. The Manor was given to the Bishops of Worcester around A.D. 850 and it has been their home for over 800 years. Their Castle is the chief object of interest in the parish. During the Commonwealth it was destroyed, and after lying in ruins 14 years was rebuilt in the reign of Charles II.

A long line of famous men have lived in the Castle. Some were canonised like Oswald, promoted by King Edgar to be Archbishop of York, as well as Bishop of Worcester, who lived a saintly life from his youth and who died at Worcester on February 28th, 992. Some were not merely prelates but statesmen, like Godfrey de Giffard and Walter de Gray, both Lord Chancellors of England. Some were Lord Treasurers, some Lord Wardens of the Welsh Marches. They frequently entertained kings and queens, princes and princesses. King John and his son, Henry III, were often the guests of the Bishop. Edward I and Edward III both visited Hartlebury, as did Queen Elizabeth I.

The Domesday Survey tells us that there was a resident priest here in 1086, so we may assume that there was a church here well before that date, and it is recorded that Bishop Samson "gave the church of Heortlabiri with the tithes of one hide of land" to the use of the monks of Worcester in 1096; and again in 1149 Bishop Simon gave the same monks "the church of Hertlebyri with the chapel and lands thereto belonging"

Of this church all we now possess is

the font.

In 1268 Bishop Godfrey de Giffard began to keep a register and we learn from it that he rebuilt the church and consecrated it on November 17th. 1269 in honour of St. James-the-Apostle. (This year is the 700th anniversary of our consecration.)

Of the 1269 church the only certain remains are the arches on the north of the chancel, the chancel and vestry walls and the window in the vestry.

In 1567 Bishop Sandys rebuilt, or more likely, restored the tower. His arms and the date are on the west side of it.

From the following entry in the register it would appear that the old church started without seats. "My Lord Bishop of Wigorn at the request of John Ellye Curate and Scholem, on the behalf of old Mr. Ayre and his wife, having himself one morning as he was going to Worcester viewed the place, and gave him leave to erect a seate right over agast the Chancell dore and next before the Scholem's seate which was erected this present month of Aug. 1606."

Shortly after coming to Hartlebury in 1818, Rector Picart restored the chancel at his own expense. He referred to the old church as "ruinous and unseemly and the most unfitted for its purpose of any within twenty

He left by his will £1,000 towards the rebuilding of the nave. Dean Peel, of Worcester, who lived in the parish, gave the porch.

The present nave was built on the old foundation and consecrated on September 27th, 1837, by Bishop Carr. The plans were by Thomas Rickman, of Birmingham, the reviver of Gothic architecture. He was undoubtedly one of the greatest architects of the 19th century.

In 1908 the old and ugly pews of painted deal were replaced by the present seats of English oak. These seats have a special interest: at the end of each are carved the names and arms and date of appointment of the bishops of the diocese, reaching back through the English, Norman and Saxon bishops to the first Bishop of Worcester, who was appointed in the year 679. This gives our church a unique interest; as far as we know there is nothing like it in any other parish church in England.

A very fine ring of eight bells hang in the tower and are suitably inscribed.

No. 1. Mears and Stainbank, Founders, London.

"Victoria."

"Man gave me voice and made me

How time doth steal his life away. But I shall sound forth from the

When man has had his little hour." Given by Alfred Baldwin, M.P., A.D.

No. 2. Mears and Stainbank, Founders, London.

> "Ring out the old, Ring in the new; Ring out the false, Ring in the true.

Given by John Corbett, of Impney, A.D. 1900.

The completed ring of eight bells was rung for the first time on May 24th, 1900, which was Ascension Day and also the Queen's birthday.

No. 3 was added to the ring of five in 1812 and has on it the names of the wardens and maker: I. Styles, I. Williams, C. W. Bryant. Hertford,

No. 4-"John Fidkin, John Wall, John Tomblins, gavrd W. Hill 1641" -has on it the names of three churchwardens and nine impressions of coins of the reign of Charles I are embedded in it. The maker's mark is a crown between three bells. At the end of the last century Mr. H. B. Walters, of the British Museum, identified it as the mark used by Hugh Watts, of Leicester (died 1643). The mark was formerly used by Brasyers, of Norwich, and is known as "Brayyer's Sprigged Shield". J. Fidkin, J. Wall and J. Tomblins were churchwardens in 1641. W. Hill was probably the donor of the bell.

No. 5 has only this short inscription: "Master Vrban Ayre 1640."

No. 6 is a very ancient and valuable bell. It is said to be of the time of Edward III (1327-1377). Upon it in very old-fashioned letters, such as were used before the days of printing, are these Latin words: "Sancta Maria Virgo intercede pro toto mvndo queya genvisti Regem Orbis", which may be translated "Holy Virgin Mary intercede for the whole world with thy Son the King of the Universe"

No. 7 has on it these words: "Master Eyre the Coroner gave this bell thirtie povnds 1640." No doubt this Mr. Eyre was an ancestor of Mrs. Hannah Eyre who in 1728 gave ten acres of land to the rector and churchwardens in order "to teach poor children at School to read and work.'

No. 8 has this inscription upon it: "I to the Church the Living call and to the grave do summon all",

with the initials A. R., probably of the maker (Abraham Rudhall, of Gloucester), and the date 1749.

Besides these there is a smaller bell used as a call bell. It has the names

of two churchwardens with date: "Richard Heming, John Harward.

Churchwardens 1678."

Ringing has always flourished here and today we have a happy and energetic band of ringers, under the tower captain, Mr. Alf Glazzard, who early this year completed 50 years as a ringer in this tower.

ABBEY FUNERAL FOR J. D. ROCK

Former Master of College Youths

The death of John Rock on October 21st, 1969, at the age of 40, has come as a tremendous shock to all who knew him. This is particularly so since he had been as active as ever in ringing circles until a mere two months before his untimely death.

John began his ringing career in his father's parish of Eardisland, in Herefordshire, during the war years when open ring-ing was still banned. He was a member of a young band, which included his brother Peter, trained by Leslie Evans. When open ringing was permitted in 1942 he and the band made rapid progress. A close and fruitful association with the Hereford ringers developed, particularly with Wilfrid and Michael Moreton, and continued for many years.

At the age of 18 he joined the Royal Regiment of Artillery for his National Service and was commissioned. On his return to civilian life he entered the University of Wales at Aberystwyth, where he successfully read for a degree in agriculture. Having obtained his degree he returned to Eardisland and resumed ringing activities, which included taking part in a record of five peals (25,920 changes) in a day. More important, perhaps, he was instrumental, with Leslie Evans, in raising the funds to have the six bells at Eardisland recast and augmented to eight.

After a time his work, which by now was chiefly concerned with advertising, brought him to London. He joined the band at Feltham and became an active member of the Middlesex Association and held for a time the office of District secretary. A change of employer brought him to work in the City, whereupon he began ringing with the College Youths and was made a member in 1958. His standard of ringing. always high, improved still further under the auspices of the London ringers, and he was elected a supernumerary ringer to Westminster Abbey in 1959 and to St. Paul's Cathedral in 1961.

His popularity and his evident qualities of leadership were such that in 1963 he was elected junior steward, subsequently becoming senior steward and, in 1965, Master of the Ancient Society of College Youths, an office he held with distinction, organising practices and presiding at meetings with a rare combination of firmness and humour. for which he was respected by everyone. In addition to his ringing activities John Rock was a keen churchman and was for a time a sidesman at St. Margaret's Church, Westminster.

He had rung in more than 1,000 towers and in over 250 peals, and most notable were 13,280 Cambridge Surprise Major at Quex Park, Bristol Surprise Major at West-minster Abbey for the 900th anniversary, and Stedman Cinques at St. Paul's Cathedral. Most treasured in his own memory, however, was a peal of Stedman Doubles, rung by the local band, at his home tower of Eardisland. Although his more recent peals were of Surprise Maximus and Stedman Cinques, he was equally happy ringing Grandsire Doubles and Minor methods, and was always willing to go on "learners" outings when asked. His own well-organised "supergrabs" were memorable annual occasions where the ringing, the bells, the food and the company were of the highest quality.

There can be no doubt that he was a traditionalist at heart who had a well-refined sense of ceremony. Always outspoken, he could be relied upon to comment firmly when required, but his most obvious quality was a well-developed sense of humour which was never far from the surface and which made him a delightful companion, and to be with him was real fun.



Those of us who were privileged to be near him during his short illness will always remember his splendid courage and patient acceptance of his impending death. For all these and other qualities he will be so sadly missed by his friends and col-leagues. Our loss, however great, is small by comparison with that suffered by his wife, Jill, his small son, Crispin, and infant daughter, Caroline. To them, and to his mother, sister and brother go our most heartfelt sympathies in this great tragedy.

THE FUNERAL

The funeral service was held in Westminster Abbey, as is usual following the death of an Abbey ringer, and on October 27th a large gathering assembled in Dean's Yard to accompany the coffin to St. Faith's Chapel. About 200 were present, and these included members of John's family, fellow Abbey ringers and St. Paul's ringers, officers and many past Masters of the Ancient Society of College Youths and the Masters of the Society of Royal Cumberland Youths and the Middlesex Association. The service was conducted by the Dean, assisted by the Precentor, who is also superintendent of the belfry, and a course of Stedman Triples was rung on handbells. The coffin remained in the Abbey overnight and next day was taken to Llandrillo, North Wales, where the formal committal service was held. Leslie Evans and Wilfrid Moreton were present to see John laid to rest in a grave near to that of his father.

A half-muffled peal of Stedman Cinques was rung on October 25th on the bells of St. Giles', Cripplegate, by ringers of West-minster Abbey, St. Paul's Cathedral and past Masters of the College Youths. On October 27th a half-muffled peal of Stedman Triples was rung at Eardisland by members of the Hereford Diocesan Guild and next day the half-muffled bells of St. Paul's Cathedral were rung. Forty rounds and forty strokes of the tenor, followed by a touch of Stedman Cinques, concluded our tribute to a great man and a fine ringer.

POINTS FROM MAIDSTONE A.G.M.

A ballot took place for the mastership of the Maidstone District at its A.G.M. at All Saints', Maidstone, on October 11th. Mr. P. S. Muchlinski was re-elected, Mr. S. A. B. Wigg being unsuccessful. Mr. C. Tester B. Wigg being unsuccessful. Mr. C. Tester was unanimously re-elected hon. District secretary and Messrs. S. P. Garner and M. Pring District representatives, thanks being passed to Mr. A. Waddington, who had held this office for 25 years or more.

Two notices of motion from the general secretary were discussed. A county striking competition was favoured and reorganisa-tion of the annual report to save money for the Belfry Fund rejected. Bedfordshire was selected for the 1970 ringing tour.

Practice evening meetings for "Beginners" and "Surprise" are to be continued but the latter is to be called "Advanced Practices" so as to include treble bob

As regards the service at by-meetings, the local clergyman is to be given the choice of either coming to the tower and meeting the ringers in their "natural" surroundings and saying a few prayers or conducting a full service.

Mr. S. A. B. Wigg asked that something be done towards restoring the peal board in Leeds Parish Church recording the first extent of Major. All agreed.

The service was conducted by Canon Tufton, with Miss Rosemary Ellis reading the lesson. A splendid tea was supplied in All Saints' Room.

500 MEMBERS IN TEN YEARS

College Youths' Annual Dinner

A consultant gynæcologist—a lithographic printer's apprentice—a clerk of works—and a bishop of the Church; men of all ages from teenagers to octogenarians with a common interest—bellringing—assembled to the number of nearly 250 on All Saints' Day at the Walbrook Restaurant, E.C., the occasion being the 332nd annual dinner of the Ancient Society of College Youths.

The excellent organisation of the function was mainly the responsibility of the secretary, Mr. J. G. A. Prior, who deserved the high praise which those who attended expressed individually and collectively.

There was plenty of opportunity for ringing at the several towers open for that purpose, and an invitation was extended to members from a distance and who were staying overnight to help with service ringing next day.

THE DINNER

The assembled company received in traditional manner the Society's officers and principal guests who occupied the top table. These were, in addition to the Master, Mr. A. N. Stubbs, the Rt. Rev. R. W. Stopford (Bishop of London), Canon N. C. S. Motley (Cornhill), the Revs. D. Harbord (Aldgate), J. McCulloch (St. Mary-le-Bow), E. Rogers (Cripplegate), R. Simpson (Precentor, Westminster Abbey), Dr. D. E. Sibson (Master, Society of Royal Cumberland Youths), Mr. T. W. White, Air Commodore J. S. Mason treasurer), Messrs. J. G. A. Prior (secretary), A. R. Kench (senior steward), D. E. Rothera (junior steward), J. S. Smallwood (trustee), W. T. Cook (librarian), P. A. Corby and A. J. Frost (past Masters).

During the meal the Master took wine with Mr. Albert Turner, a member for 61 years, and with Messrs. Bill Rawlings, Bill Hibbert and Herbert ("Brig") Young, mem-

bers for 50 years.

Following the loyal toast the Master rose to propose the toast of "The Church". He emphasised the importance of ringers to realise they were part of the Church universal. The Ancient Society to which they belonged had many aims and objects, and it was for them to wish success to another more ancient society—the Church—and in particular the Established Church in this country.

Many problems beset the Church, said the Master, and one which is particularly acute now is how to maintain and promote the so simple and basic truths of the Christian religion in a world where values and standards are changing faster than ever before. And so with ringing, we have to maintain the standards of good striking and regular Sunday service ringing in an age where ever-increasing feats of intelligence and physical achievement have become such an essential part of the scene.

In welcoming the Bishop and the clergy who were present the Master thanked them for the generous way they made the bells available for the furtherance of the art of bellringing, and for their part the ringers would continue to call the faithful to wor-

ECCLESIASTICAL HERITAGE

The Bishop of London, in replying, said that bellringers had a specialised ministry within the Church, as did the clergy. The art of change-ringing was a unique eccle-siastical heritage. He expressed thanks to ringers everywhere for their immense devotion in order that the bells might ring. The attendance that evening of so many young people was a very encouraging sign for bellringing of the future, which was an audio-aid to the life and work of the Church.

"The Ancient Society of College Youths" was proposed by Canon N. C. S. Motley, who in a speech which was both witty and amusing said that bells spell out so many things in life, and if they ceased we would move back one stage further into the secu-"I know that I and the Bishop lar society. and my fellow clergy thank God for the Ancient Society and all the other Societies and ringers everywhere," concluded the speaker, "and long may you continue."

THE YEAR'S WORK

Responding to the toast, the secretary said that when he was a young ringer, many years ago, he was told: "It's a waste of time and money to join the College Youths or Cumberlands—they are on the wished those prophets of doom could see how wrong they were for the two old Societies were stronger than ever and the well-attended dinners gave a good indication of this.

Mr. Prior continued: "Tonight there are 248 people present from 28 counties as far apart as Lancashire and Cornwall, Yorkshire and Devon, including parties from Bristol, Coventry, Liverpool, Birmingham and from Berkshire and Somerset, and it is gratifying that there is a large contingent from the Oxford Society, the Oxford University Society and Appleton, for our Master is not unknown in those parts.

Included in the apologies were William Shepherd, one of the oldest members, who ioined the Society in 1900 and is a living link with the Master of 100 years ago, Edwin Horrex, and George Symonds who was present last year and is the oldest and most senior member. He joined the Society in 1898, will be 95 this year and is still an active ringer. [Applause.]

"I am sure that all present would wish me to send our greetings to these two grand veterans," added the speaker, to which there were cries of "Hear, hear!"

A notable absentee was Cyril Watts a past Master of the Society and who served as treasurer for 12½ years. A presentation was made to him to mark the appreciation for all that he had done for the Society. and his place as treasurer was being ably filled by Air Commodore J. S. Mason.

"It is a long-established custom that at these festivities we honour the memory of those who have passed on," continued Mr. Prior, "and since the last dinner we have heard of the deaths of 17 members. We remember them all, but there are two of whom there should be special mention— Elsie Hairs and John Rock,

"Elsie Hairs joined the Society with her husband, Frank. in 1917, and were both with us in this room last year. The death of Elsie marked the end of an era, for she was the last of the nine ladies who had been elected to membership of the Society.

"John Rock, who died on October 21st at the early age of 40, after a comparatively short illness, was a tremendous shock,

even to those of us who knew of the serious nature of his illness. Our deepest sympathy goes to his young wife, Jill, and their two children. John was a popular and respected member who joined in 1958 and in 1965 was elected Master—a post he filled with great distinction. He was connected with the bands at St. Paul's Cathedral and Westminster Abbey. John will be greatly missed by all of us."

MANY NEW MEMBERS

The secretary then continued: "Any Society if it is to remain vigorous and healthy needs a continuous flow of new members, and in this respect we are very fortunate. Since the last dinner we have elected 42 new members, and I have been asked what the membership of the Society is. Because of our life membership system it is not possible to give an accurate answer, but the total must be considerably in excess of 1,000. In the last ten years alone we have elected nearly 500 members."

PEALS

Since the last dinner the Society had recorded 43 peals, including some of more than ordinary interest, the conducting hav-ing been shared by 21 members. Of this total, 28 were 12-bell peals (nine Cinques and 19 Surprise Maximus) and one of the

peals of Stedman Cinques was rung nonconducted and another was rung halfmuffled in memory of John D. Rock.

The peal of Yorkshire Royal at Guildford Cathedral on August 9th was a compliment to Mr. and Mrs. W. J. Rawlings for their golden wedding. (Mr. Rawlings,

who was present, received loud applause.)
Of the four peals of Londinium, two
were rung on the same day by different
bands but without previous arrangement.
The peal of Bristol Maximus rung at
Reading on October 26th was the first by

the Society and it was rung with 4ths place

There were two peals at St. Paul's Cathedral—one of Stedman Cinques and one of Cambridge Maximus. The Stedman Cinques was a compliment to Bishop Wand, former Bishop of London, upon his retirement, whilst that of Cambridge Maximus was as it questioned the integrity and honesty rung for the Investiture of H.R.H. the of the peal ringer. "He won't thank me for drawing attention to this," said Mr. Prior, "but he ought to know how may have admin the ought to know how much we admire his performances." [Applause.]

In June the Society had an outstandingly successful meeting in Birmingham and Solihull and next year had accepted an invitation to visit Bristol, in which there were

many keen and loval members.

MR. WHITE HONOURED

"And now, gentlemen," concluded the speaker, "there is just a little more to be said, and I have quite deliberately left it to Seated on my left is one who for 23 years has attended these dinners as a guest of the Society but who has had to work hard all the evening. I refer, of course, to our very good friend Tom White, until lately Editor of 'The Ringing World'. [Applause.] Week after week 'The Ringing World" arrives, and we take it for granted but 1 wonder if we appreciated sufficiently just how much devoted effort he put into its production? Tom was unflagging in carrying out his task, sometimes under very difficult circumstances for what, as the officers of the Central Council have so rightly said, by no stretch of imagination could be called a commercial reward.

'The Master and officers of the Society thought it right to invite Tom to this dinner so that we could say publicly how grateful we are to him for all that he has done and so that this large and representative gather-

ing could show its appreciation." [Applause.]
Mr. Prior added: "It may be unorthodox to end the response to a toast by proposing another, but the occasion justifies such a course and so, Master, my Lord Bishop and gentlemen, will you please be upstanding and drink to the health of Tom White—may he have a long and happy retirement."
The toast was duly honoured and Mr.

White suitably replied.

TOAST OF "THE GUESTS"

The toast of "The Guests" was honoured on the call of the junior steward, Mr. D. Rothera. He welcomed individually the Bishop and clergy present, mentioning particularly the varied career of Rev. D. Harbord, rector of Oldgate. The Master of the Cumberland Youths, Mr. Derek Sibson, received a special welcome, and the speaker paid tribute to his capabilities of leadership and his work as secretary of his Society for

many years.

The possibility of change in the layout of "The Ringing World" was mentioned when Mr. Rothera welcomed the new editors. tor and expressed the hope that peal reports would not suffer a curtailment. He went on to suggest ways of saving space and costs in the paper and concluded by expressing an opinion that a rope tax of 6d, could be

made for all peal ringers.

PEAL RINGERS' INTEGRITY DOUBTED

Mr. Derek Sibson, responding, thanked the Society on behalf of the eight guests present, six of whom were clergy, for the most enjoyable evening spent and the hospitality given. He went on to speak of the recent item in "The Ringing World" which mentioned the possibility of one day having umpires to check peal ringing. It would be a sad day when this happened, particularly

Proposing the toast (drunk in silence) to the memory of the Masters of 300, 200 and 100 years ago, the Master gave the follow-

ing details:-

John Broomhead was elected Master in 1669. He had joined the Society in 1655 and was steward in 1665, but nothing is known further about him. There is also no record of the Master of either the "Ancient" or the "Junior" branch of the Society in 1769. Two peals are shown in the book for that year—Reverse Bob Maximus at St. Bride's and Reverse Caters at Shoreditch, both rung by the Junior Society.

Edwin Horrex, who was elected Master in 1869, was born in 1838 and died at the age of 87 on October 7th, 1925, on the day of the annual dinner. He came to London from Ipswich and was elected a member of the Society in 1863, for which he rang about 200 peals, the most outstanding being the 11,111 Stedman Caters at Fulham in 1883. He represented the College Youths on the Central Council for the years 1918–21, and the Master added: "Many present

here tonight must have known him."
The "get-together" which followed was informal and lasted until after midnight.

THE MELBOURNE PEAL

Dear Sir,-I have read your Comment-"Throwing Down the Gauntlet" (on page 825) a number of times, but the more I read it the more puzzled I become.

In your second paragraph you say you are not the arbiter of what constitutes a true peal, and with this statement I am sure no one will disagree. We have, over the years, come to regard the Editor of "The Ringing World" as impartial, but could "Comment" be more biased? I doubt it. The very first paragraph/sentence implies doubt as to the quality of the peals rung on the tour without producing any evidence. I am quite sure that Mr. Rowson did not intend his letter to be read this way and, incidentally, I imagine he must have been surprised that you should consider him something of a hero! I don't think that, as organiser, I should say any more about the tour in general as I am sure some of those who took part will take up this point.

I suppose you have a right, if you wish to do so, to instruct Mr. Rowson in the procedure which he should have followed in this case had he intended to lodge an official complaint, but wouldn't it have been wiser to have read the relevant Decision published on page 479 of your journal first and given correct information?

No doubt the officers of the Derbyshire Association appreciate your thoughtfulness in reminding them of their duty, but I thought this Association was affiliated to the Central Council and, therefore, bound to work in accordance with the Decisions of such Council and not as you think they should.

Why do you place such significance on the number of peals in hand? By my reckoning 150 peals would take up about ten pages, i.e., about two issues. Is this an unreasonable number at this time of year?

I did wonder if it was worthwhile taking up the gauntlet which you, Mr. Editor, have thrown down but, as you have come down so heavily against the peal in question without waiting either for confirmation of Mr. Rowson's allegations or allowing the conductor and the rest of the band the right of reply, feel that you have invited criticism, and I await with interest your explanation.

Perhaps you have through journalistic enthusiasm, in an attempt to produce lively correspondence, suggested more than you intended and, had you written in general terms after this issue had been decided, you would have earned yourself the respect of the Exercise. As it is you have involved all those who took part in the tour, turning this comparatively minor matter into a major issue and, incidentally, caused some distress both to myself as the organiser and to many of those taking part in the tour. -Yours faithfully,

ROWSON SHOULD HAVE SET HIS

Dear Sir,-I can appreciate that Mr. C. Rowson does not wish to be associated with a peal for the reasons he has given, but why make an issue of this now? Surely the issue in the first onset was with Mr.

Some years ago I was asked to ring a peal in Surrey and it was to be either Stedman or Grandsire. On arrival at the tower I was told that the method had been changed for another because there had also been a change in the band. The peal started and previously to this I had said that I was not too conversant with the method. Part of the way through the peal I was obviously not doing very well, and a ringer (I believe it was George Mason) told me that unless I did better he would "set his bell up". I must have done better because he did not carry out his threat, and I feel that had the ringing been of poor quality he would have done so.

Similarly, if Mr. Rowson felt that the ringing was bad he could have so acted and it would have been better for all concerned. Now he has allowed what might possibly have been a peal to pass without doing anything on the spot, and the wrangling that follows does not help the ringers of

the peal, or ringing as a whole.

May I commend George Mason's attitude to all ringers now. At that time he had the courage to make his feelings felt in the middle of a peal and put things right at the time. Obviously this must be carried out in moderation and with the knowledge that the protester is correct and, of course, has the assent of the conductor. I feel that it was wrong to have allowed the peal to go to its bitter end and then grumble afterwards.

I am afraid that ill-health has prevented me from ringing for some years, but I am still very interested in the Exercise.—Yours

THE SNOWDON

The 37th annual commemoration dinner of the Yorkshire Association was held at York on October 25th. The Minster bells were rung during the afternoon and many visitors attended evensong at 4 p.m.. when prayers were said for the work of the Association. The anthem was "Rejoice in the Lord" (the Bell Anthem) and the service ended with the ringers' hymn.

A company of 108 assembled in the ancient hall of the Merchant Taylors Company and enjoyed the typically English dinner of roast beef and Yorkshire pudding.

The toast of "The Church" was proposed by Mr. Wilfrid Moreton, who spoke of church unity. "Many Anglicans and Methodists did a lot of heart searching this year." he said, "and found it difficult to repair the breaches of the past. If the decision last July not to unite had been different there would still be a lot of problems to solve. Uniting two parts of the Church is a very difficult matter and I hope the efforts of recent years will bear fruit in due course."

In reply, the Dean of York, the Very Rev. Alan Richardson, said the response to the York Minster appeal had been fantastic. No other cathedral had had to appeal for such an amount and it exceeds the total for all other cathedrals in England many times. The amount donated to date was £1,729,000 towards the £2m. needed, and he was proud of the fact that four-fifths of it came from Yorkshire. He added that York Minster symbolised the Church in the North of England. Concluding, the Dean said that 1972 marks the 500th anniversary of the completion of the building of the Minster and he invited the Association to "help us in our rejoicing that the Minster will then be safe, by ringing to the glory of God".

The toast "To the memory of Jasper Whitfield Snowdon and Past Officers of the Association" was proposed by the Rev. Giles C. Galley, M.A., who said that Jasper was a founder and first President of the Association. His series of books had been of immense benefit to all ringers, said Mr. Galley, and concluded with the lines written by J. Martin Routh, a former Master of the College Youths.

"What though the deeds in which he played his part,

Are not inscribed on England's roll of fame.

As long as future ages prize our art, So long shall reverence be for Snowdon's name."

A touch of Caters on handbells followed the toast, which is customary at the Snowdon dinners.

The Rev. Giles Galley was congratulated during the evening on his appointment to be Vicar of St. Michael and All Angels, North Hull.

Mr. Fermor concluded by saying that the country was richer and happier because of bells and ringers, and during a morning walk he thanked God for the beauty of a God-made noise—the sound of a lark—and for a man-made noise—the glorious music of a ring of bells.

HENRY O. BAKER

With the sudden death on September 14th of Henry O. Baker the Chester Guild suffered the loss of a general secretary who had thrown himself wholeheartedly into the work from the moment he took over from the Rev. John Kingdon in 1958 as a stopgap until the next annual meeting.

His name first appears in the Guild records in 1946 for his early ringing career was in the neighbouring county of Shropshire, where he was a member of the Bridgnorth band, who made something of a name for themselves for enterprise. He soon became associated with the West Cheshire band, under the late J. C. E. Simpson, and took part in several firsts for the Guild. He took part in the record peal of 21,600 Bristol at Over on November 4th, 1950, and followed this in 1951 by taking part in 15,480 Cambridge Surprise Royal at Worsley, the only peal of over 10,000 which J. C. E. Simpson ever rang. He took part in many of the joint efforts of East and West Cheshire and in particular ringing tours in various parts of the country. His long association with the farming community had given him a fund of stories which livened many a long journey or lessened the tension the evening before an important event.

When the Rev. John Kingdon took over the living of St. Mary-within-the-Walls, Chester, and soon afterwards the general secretaryship of the Guild, Harry assisted him in many ways. They delved into composition together and produced some unorthodox compositions, some of which Harry called. When in 1958 Rev. John Kingdon decided to retire rather suddenly, the Guild was faced with the prospect of having to appoint a caretaker general secretary for six months, but Mr. Kingdon had foreseen this and had prepared Harry for the job, and it is true to say that the changeover was never felt. At the next annual meeting he was overwhelmingly voted into office, despite the fact that it was almost traditional that the general secretary be a clergyman. From then onwards he worked unceasingly for the good of the

Guild and Exercise, and when soon afterwards his health prevented him from taking part in active ringing he devoted himself even more to the organisation of the Guild.

In 1964 the annual meeting decided to guarantee £1,000 to the authorities at Chester Cathedral towards the restoration of the bells. This became his special task and he worked at it until finally a meeting was held with the Dean to discuss the matter. It was then left to the Guild to provide information and lists, and these were all got together by him. By this time, however, it had been decided that a much bigger scheme would be launched in connection with the Cathedral with the bells as an important part. He had repeated meetings with the Dean and eventually the scheme which was announced was devised. By this time the majority of the money promised had been subscribed and he was indeed proud to hand a cheque for £1,000 to the Dean early this year, as the Diocesan Guild's contribution to the Restoration Fund. He had already begun to train ringers for the new bells and to gather funds for the proper furnishing of the ringing room. It is hoped that work on the tower will not be long delayed, but the Guild must ensure that the determination and enthusiasm which he showed is carried on and the scheme brought to fruition at the earliest possible moment. We owe that to his memory.

He was always a modest man whose aim was to serve the Guild and the Exercise, and we shall all miss those little reminders of things outstanding which he used to send to keep everyone up to scratch. He rang 396 peals, of which 178 were for the Chester Guild; but the list is not at present available for analysis, but when it is it will be seen that they covered a wide field from Grandsire Doubles to Cambridge Maximus. To his widow and daughter and son-in-law we offer our sincere sympathy, and we have suffered a grievous loss for we shall find it hard to find someone to take his place.

STOP PRESS

Marple have done it again! Twelve Spliced Surprise methods to a peal "in hand" on October 30th—as a farewell to one of their team, Bernard Groves.

To ring 250 peals together may not be a record, but is worthy of comment. Mr. J. Alan Ainsworth and Mr. Norman J. Goodman reached this total at Chittlehampton on September 27th.

The very well known ringer and conductor Mr. R. B. Smith completed 500 peals for the Chester Guild on October 15th, and three days later was part of the band which enabled Mr. S. 1. Bamforth to conduct his first peal.

KENT RINGERS IN WALES

A company of 43 North Kent bellringers and friends enjoyed their fifth week-end tour by travelling to Gloucestershire and South Wales—a five-hour journey—starting on Friday, October 3rd. The night was spent in Cheltenham. and at Stone—the first tower next day—the small belfry matched the bells, which were rather "jingly".

The heavy-going ring of eight at Thornbury was enjoyed, and here an old friend, Mr. Dennis Chapman, met the party. Everyone was very impressed by the Severn Bridge, which was crossed, and following lunch at Newport the six Rumney bells enabled Miss Jean Sanderson to gain her thousandth tower.

The eight at Cowbridge were noisy outside, and after Bridgend (8) and tea the best bells of the week-end were rung at St. Bride's Major (6). This was followed by the pleasant ring at the Church of St. Illtyd, Llantwit Major, where the six have a 12 cwt. tenor.

The night was spent at Pontypridd and all attended Holy Communion at 8 the next morning, and later rang for morning service, which completed the ringing for the week-end.

A very pleasant drive home was enjoyed and thanks were extended to Mr. Laurie Mitchell, who organised the tour.

THIEVES FOILED IN SUFFOLK RAID

Latest raid by bell thieves reported to us is from the isolated church at Ramsholt, about five miles from Felixstowe and approached by a narrow farm road.

Their main target was a 17th century bell in the tower. They cut through a rope holding the bell, then eased it to a trap-door and dropped it 25 feet on to the floor below. This floor turned out to be the ceiling of the vestry, which held and prevented the 5 cwt. bell crashing through to the ground. A wooden joist was badly damaged and ceiling boards shattered; the bell was hardly damaged.

Thus foiled, the thieves took two Charles chairs worth hundreds as collectors'

The Rector (Rev. G. Vincent) said the bell, dated 1679, had been in the church for "hundreds of years" and is inscribed "John Darbie made me". "Police think it would have taken four or five men to get it to the trap-door," he added.

Recent Suffolk church hauls include a solid silver rose bowl, "irreplaceable" metal candlesticks, a £50 icon and pieces of 17th century armour.

METHODS RECORD

At Holme Pierrepont, Notts, on October 24th, a peal of 210 methods of Spliced Treble Bob Minor was rung, conducted by R. Brian Mills. This is the greatest number of methods yet rung to a peal and the maximum possible in seven extents of T.B. Minor.

MEMORIAL SERVICE

A memorial service for the late Mr. Ben S. Thompson, which was held at Pakefield on November 1st, was conducted jointly by the Rev. Peter N. Bond, who gave the address, and Canon D. N. E. Bringloe. The bells were rung before and after the service, which was attended by over 40 ringers and friends.

PRINCIPLES OF INSTRUCTION Bell Handling and Control

(9) Ear-Training and "Bell Pause". As we have seen, bell control is to be acquired "silently", and the elements of change-ringing are to be practised silently up to the point when the bells are "opened" for the main objective of good striking. For this the pupil requires two accomplishments—Recognition of (a) Bell-tone and (b) Bell-pause. For the first of these the pupil is checked for, and if necessary given practice in, recognising the notes of bells. Tapped handbells, or even a toy "dulcimer", are useful for this purpose. Start with, say, four notes at the lower end of an octave. Tap rounds three or four times to "fix" the pitch of the notes, then strike any one of them and ask for its place. Work up to tests on eight, including well-known changes such as Queens, Tittums and Whittingtons. Then, on open tower bells, the pupil is to listen, from the start, for his "own-bell" note—helped by noting, particularly, that bell-tone in "rounds".

The second of these most important factors, "Bell-pause", is, of course, the interval between the pull-off of the bell and the striking of its clapper. This varies according, approximately, to the weight of the bell. Its appreciation, in practice, is the basis of rhythmic ringing and good striking. How is this appreciation gained? By the pupil's close attention, in the early stages of "open" ringing (rounds, call-changes, etc.), to each stroke of his bell, noting the interval between his mental place-counting and his bell's note (assuming the count is simultaneous with the pull-off). As soon as these two factors—Bell-tone and Bell-pause—are appreciated by the pupil, his ability to strike with precision will develop.

(10) Call changes, "dodging rounds", etc., before Methods. The pupil's first listening to his ringing comes, as we have seen, in the rounds that are rung as a preliminary to the open "elements of change ringing", referred to in feature (9) above. When consistent striking is shown the exercise is extended to call-changes, to accustom the pupil to 'all-round" rope-sight. Then follows "dodging rounds"—a real test of striking. In this exercise on the call "Go dodging rounds!" all bells change places in pairs, except on odd numbers, e.g., five, when the tenor remains behind. (In fact this is the first change of Plain Bob.) This change takes place, of course, on the handstroke.

Then, on the backstroke, the bells dodge back into rounds. This is continued, repetitively, until "That's all" brings rounds.

To see how these principles work out in practice we now consider, in turn and in some detail, the four "Musts" we listed at the outset, noting when and how the new features are applied.

1. PLANNING. (A) "Common sense application." The training unit is the "Group" of up to four pupils, each of whom takes turn in practice on a silenced bell, while the others watch and note faults and correctives. But up to all four in a group can work simultaneously if the group instructor has a capable assistant for each pupil. As many as four of such groups, i.e., 16 pupils in all, have been worked simultaneously, with an assistant in charge of each group, and each pupil in the group taking his turn on a rope.
